effort in trying to "see the quints." Their first attempt had met with success. That same morning over 1,000 had been unable to get a view of the children, in fact many people are unable to see the babies the first day they visit Callander. That morning on which our visitors saw Yvonne, Annette, Cecile, Emilie and Marie, the babies were alone in their playground playing with shovels, pails and other children's tools. They wore woollen sweaters and corduroy overalls and tams on their heads, it being a rather cool day. For the first time since the birth of Corbett's renowned quintet the peaceful quiet of their parental home was disturbed recently by the opening of a souvenir and refreshment booth on the premises by Mr. Dionne.

However, life in the Dionne home pursues its even tenor, without cognizance of the limelight into which it was thrust. Fame has not interfered with the normal everyday existence of the spot-lighted family.

Visitors to Dafoe Hospital are oftentimes unaware that the simple farmhouse across the way is the home of the world's most famous parents. While the quintuplets occupy the centre of the stage in a drama which astounded the world, the other members of the family, their mother and father, shun the spotlight of popularity and prefer to live quietly in the home which Mr. Dionne's parents occupied before him.

The quints enjoy privileges ultra-modern, yet their sisters, brothers and parents are content with the facilities of decades ago. True, clothing and food are more varied, but essentially life moves on just about the same as if the startling birth had happened in China.

Mrs. Dionne runs the course of everyday domesticity, making meals, drying dishes and putting rooms in order. The children are despatched to school, where they mingle with the other students, more or less oblivious of the fame attached to their name.

Furnishings in the house are simple, a table covered with white oilcloth, a large cabinet, a kitchen range chair and cretonne curtains. When Edward VIII recently succeeded to the Crown and realms of England, he also inherited the guardianship of the world's five most famous little girls—the Dionne Quintuplets. The celebrated infants became the wards of his father, King George V, by an Act of King-in-council, shortly after their birth, through the agency of the Ontario Legislature.

of the Health Department of New Brunswick in October, 1922, and continued in that office up until the time of his death. Dr. Bailey was a charter member and Past Master of Sunbury Lodge, F. & A. M. of Fredericton Junction, and a member of Hiram Lodge in this city. He was a member of the executive of the Red Cross Society and also, until recently, a member of the executive of the York and Sunbury Historical Society. Dr. Bailey was one of the founders of the York and Sunbury Historical Society and took an active interest in its welfare. He was a member of the A. & B. Club in this city. He was a former demonstrator in botany at McGill University. He was a past president of the Fredericton Science Club, a member of the Natural History Society of New Brunswick and a Fellow of the American Geological Society of New York. He has all his life been a member of the Cathedral congregation, Church of England, in this city.

Dr. Bailey, following the lines of his father, the late L. W. Bailey, F. R.S.C., and of his grandfather, Marshall the Baron d'Avery, took an active interest in historical, geographical, and natural history subjects. He also had one of the best collections of photographs of New Brunswick scenery.

On August 1, 1908, Dr. Bailey was married at Montreal to Miss Gwendolyn Eunice S. Dyer, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Dyer of that city. He is survived by Mrs. Bailey and by one daughter, Doris Marie d'Avray, wife of Rev. Edgar M. Baird, United Church missionary at Popular River, Manitoba, and one son, Reginald W. Bailey, teacher of manual training in the Sackville school and an undergraduate in arts at Mount Allison University. Reginald only left here on Saturday last to take up his college work. The two brothers, Baron d'Avray of Quebec, and Henry of Halifax, and two sisters, Mrs. West and Miss Laureline Bailey of Halifax, also survive.

The funeral will take place Wednesday afternoon from his home at 366 University Avenue. Prayers will be conducted at the house at two o'clock by Very Rev. Dr. W. H. Moorhead, dean of the Cathedral. The service at the Cathedral will take place at 2:30 o'clock after which interment will be made at Forest Hill Cemetery.
