### ENTER PARTNERSHIP

J. Arthur Leger, Moncton, and Leon J. LeBlanc of the same place, have entered into a general co-partnership business under the name of "The Tube Shop" for the purpose of electricians and mechanical engineers of carrying on the business of general contractors. The partnership began on October 1.

### A NEW COMPANY

This week's Royal Gazette contains notice of the formation of a new company, "Saint John Elks Property Company, Limited." Those incorporated are Hazen B. McMann, William J. Anderson, and H. Vincent MacGillivray, all of the city of Saint John, the purposes of the company being to carry on the business of hotel, inn, restaurant, etc. Capital stock is \$10,000.

### SAWFLY ON INCREASE

R. E. Balch, entomologist in charge of the Dominion laboratory here, returned yesterday from a trip to the Northwest Miramichi where he inspected the area there for spruce saw fly infestation. Mr. Balch found that the infestation had increased considerably. There was not much noticeable damage done to the trees up to the present time, but there was considerable increase in the quantity of insects.

### SERVICE RESTORED

The service of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, which was out of order in many parts of the province on Thanksgiving day because of the heavy windstorm, was nearly restored today. Workmen were busily engaged yesterday in repairing circuits which had been out of order. Today workmen of the city were engaged in some parts of the city in clearing away broken limbs of trees which had been broken off by the wind.

Superintendent W. V. M. Bruce, who arrived here this week from Lethbridge, Alta., is on an inspection trip of the various R.C.M.P. detachments through the province. He already has taken over command of the "J" Division, New Brunswick. Superintendent Bruce has been accompanied on his tour of inspection by Major E. C. P. Salt, who is leaving this week for Lethbridge, to take over the duties of superintendent there. Mrs. Salt and family already have left for Alberta.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest L. Ipsen of North Dartmouth, Mass., who spent the past summer at their cottage at Boiestown, are now at North Dartmouth and plan to leave early next month for Florida where they will remain for the winter. During their sojourn in the province, Mr. and Mrs. Ipsen indulged in their favorite pastime, salmon angling, both at the Hart's Island pool and on the Miramichi. While fishing at the Hart's Island pool, they made their headquarters at the Queen Hotel. ## Cabinet Minister Makes History Flight Here

### WORK DONE BY THE N. B. APPLE EXCHANGE HERE

Of Much Benefit to Farmers of Central New Brunswick

#### A. G. Turney's Aid

How Sorting and Packing Different Grades Carried Out

The New Brunswick Apple Exchange, Limited, situated on Regent Street in this city, is now going at full speed. More than a dozen employees, men and women, are busy grading and packing apples, assisted by machinery amazingly simple and clever.

The Exchange first started operating in 1930. A small group of farmers provided part of the capital, the Government putting up one half of the total amount raised by the fruit growers. Since then, the Government has assisted the Exchange only with technical advice, market statistics, etc.

Each year the stockholders receive a dividend on their investment, but this is only a small part of the benefit they reap.

The farmer who raises several hundred barrels of apples and has to grade and sort them by home methods finds it a long, tiresome and expensive task. Moreover, the sorting is not apt to be as accurate as the machinery at the Exchange can do it. This work benefits from the lower cost of mass production and by shipping to distant markets in carload lots the transportation cost per barrel is materially lowered.

The huge cellar of the Exchange building is so constructed that apples can be stored there until the end of December without artificial heat. Thus the apples can be held without cost until the winter market is at its best. The ensuing profit accrues to the shareholders.

While the service rendered to the farmers is primarily for those owning stock in the Exchange, it is not limited to that group. Any farmer raising a sufficient quantity of apples to warrant it may make use of the facilities offered by paying a fee to the Exchange based on the number of barrels handled.

The present stockholders are The New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association and eighteen farmers living within a radius of sixteen miles of Fredericton. Although at present this is the only Apple Exchange in New Brunswick, the Government is willing to assist in forming others where apple growing is a sufficiently large industry to justify the expenditure of public funds. ### GOV'T MINISTER ARRIVED HERE BY PLANE TODAY

Hon. F. W. Pirie "Flew" From Home at Grand Falls

#### Cabinet in Session

Premier, Other Ministers Arrive For Afternoon Meeting

The provincial cabinet ministers assembled here today for a meeting of the cabinet which is scheduled for this afternoon and evening. Premier A. A. Dysart arrived here last evening from his home in Buctouche and last night and this morning was engaged in departmental business.

Hon. F. W. Pirie, minister of lands and mines, set a precedent for cabinet ministers when he "flew" here this morning from his home in Grand Falls in order to attend the meeting. It is probably the first time in the history of the province that a cabinet minister attended a government meeting via aeroplane. Hon. Mr. Pirie arrived here in a Waco five-place cabin biplane, alighting in Kelly's field at 9.30 o'clock. Joseph Folkins, veteran Woodstock flier, piloted the cabinet minister to the city, and returned to his home after alighting with his passenger.

Asked upon his arrival whether the government had purchased the plane for use in the forestry service of the province, Mr. Pirie said he had nothing to say in the matter at the present time.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of health and labor, has arrived here and this morning was at work in his department. The other ministers are expected early this afternoon.

It is understood that no delegations are appearing before the government at its sessions this week. The meeting will likely continue over into Thursday.

### AWAIT ACTION ON YORK COUNTY ABATTOIR PLANT

General Committee Will Meet Hon. A. C. Taylor This Week

#### May Go to Ottawa

City of Fredericton Has Completed Survey of County

The York county abattoir and cold storage plant which has been under consideration for several months, is expected to be given consideration here this week. Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney general of the province who is chairman of a general committee enquiring into the full matter of the establishment of an abattoir here states that he will confer with Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, this week in connection with the matter.

Although it was announced last week that members of this general committee composed of representatives from this city and the county of York, would go to Ottawa to confer with federal officials, the date on which this delegation will leave for Ottawa is yet undecided. The federal department of agriculture, it is understood, will grant a certain amount for the cold storage.

Hon. Mr. Taylor, minister of agriculture, is expected here this afternoon or early this evening to attend a meeting of the cabinet, and he is expected to be in touch with Hon. Mr. McNair and members of the abattoir (Continued on Page Five)

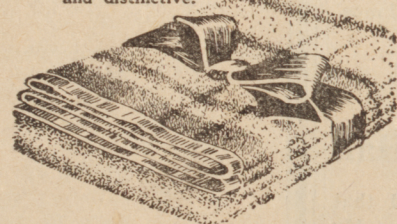

### FOUNDERS' DAY OBSERVED BY LOCAL GYROS

First Gyro Club Formed in April, 1912, at Cleveland

On May 27, 1937, the Fredericton Gyro Club will complete a decade of service to this community coincident with the tenth year of its existence. Robert "Bob" Hawkins was the first president of the Fredericton Gyros, and Frank Osborne is president now. Since its inception the local club has performed a wide general service to the community. Among its good works is the equipping of the Gyro Dental Clinic, formation of a Gyro Boy Scout troop, donating to the needy at Christmas and at other times during the year, and assisting the Victorian Order of Nurses here.

James T. Mavor occupied the chair at last night's meeting at the Nutpals and the secretary, F. Leslie Mavor gave a brief talk on Gyro since its inception.
