EXCURSION TO MONTREAL

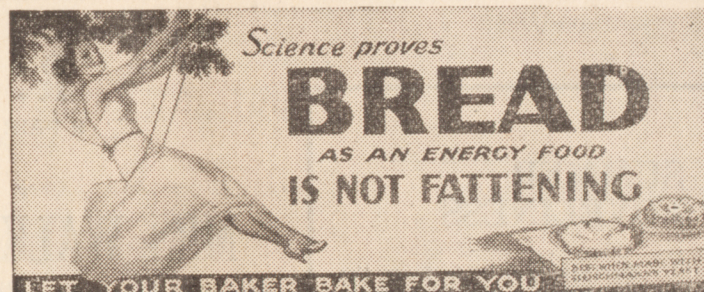
