Both had been hanging fire for some time and, despite rumors, the fireworks predicted did not take place.

The executive of the association decided that the Moncton Maroons must pay the Hampton Osseages the sum of \$62.92 as Hampton's receipts in a playoff fixture at the Hub last season. If the Moncton Club, when notified by the secretary to pay this sum to the Hampton club, disregards the order they will be barred by the association.

The executive also abided by the ruling of Sheriff C. D. Shipley, secretary treasurer of the M.P.B.A.A.U. of C. that Clifford (Lefty) Kerrigan, now with the Devon Club, must play ball this season with the Saint John Pontiacs, unless given his release by the local club, or not at all.

Sheriff Shipley told the executive that he had issued Kerrigan's card to the Pontiacs and he would not issue another to play with Devon unless the player was released by the Pontiacs.
