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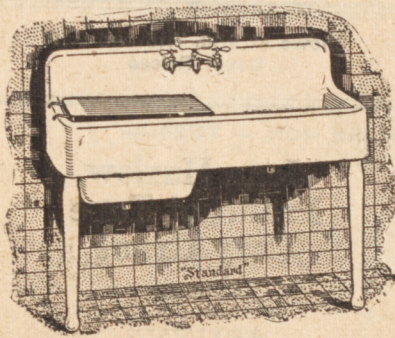

A tour of the check plots gave the visitors an opportunity to see for themselves the benefits derived from the use of fertilizers and lime. As each plot was examined, Mr. Hetherington explained the treatment given. A field of millet is being tried out as a possible source of green feed for the farm animals during the late summer months.

Mr. Bailey told, in an interesting manner, of experiments in pasture fertilization at the Experimental Station. Five check plots were laid out, four being cultivated and seeded with different varieties of grass seed, the fifth receiving only fertilizer. The results were amazing, the fifth plot giving, by far, the best growth of grass.

Leonard Griesbach, of the Experimental Station, gave a practical talk on the care of chickens and hens.

At the close of Mr. Hetherington's programme, Raymond Wetmore, the district representative, gave the boys and girls some practice in the judging of dairy cattle.

## Interest to Women

### DEPEND ON COLOR FOR DISTINCTION IN YOUR FRESH MIDSUMMER COSTUME

Shops Indorse Beige, Yellow or Green With Black, or Red and White With Navy—Beige Shown With Brown, Again, Too

Accessories are the life of a summer costume. Discreet accents of color can give to an ordinary dark town dress that exciting minor note which hints of approaching fall. Well-chosen bags and gloves, likewise, can convert a little country cotton into a sophisticated city costume. Concentrate then, as fashion marks time until the openings, on styling up the frocks you already have on hand. And it's fun, you'll discover, working out color ideas.

Up town one of the shops is going in for beige and black. They have the beige in velvet berets, in doekin gloves, and in stockings, of course. Their new blacks are princess line satins and crepes and woolsens; black, loosely-woven linen jackets; beige, loosely-woven woolen skirts. They have a beige corduroy jacket, which they suggest for fishing, of all things. They show large beige chiffon squares, which can be worn casually about the neck of a black sports dress or carried as a handkerchief. Wear shiny patent asdands and carry a patent bag in black.

Their new afternoon purses are small and pouchy, in a heavy and lustrous black satin. They add bright green as a third color to this combination. You can work it out in a variety of ways yourself. Keep the fundamental part of your costume black—the dress and shoes and bag—add beige elsewhere and use green once, as a surprise effect.

### Challis Shoes

The same shop has charming black challis sandals, printed in red roses. There is a scarf and head band to match these. Wear them with a black shantung or linen dress in the country, or a deep red cotton of the picturesque variety.

Another shop has adopted the French tri-color, which is another way of saying red, white and blue to us. Gay little cockades on felt hats, tri-colored beaded jewelry, clifton squares as scarves or handkerchiefs. Or you might, on a plain white silk dress, wear a red chiffon scarf at the neck, and if you're quite slim tie two in blue together and let them encircle the waist, in the manner of the Hollywood girls.

In jewelry we found a crisp little

white braid bracelet set with a red anchor. And the same place has cool greens and yellows; but wear these whenever possible with solid colors, as they're apt to cause too much confusion of design with prints.

Glazed surfaces are ever so much cooler looking than duller ones. That's why we like the loose bunches of grapes in all colors, which would add so to a summer frock.

If you have a separate skirt in navy or white you'd like to use try a tunic of striped ticking. These have enormous bags to match. The tunics could be worn over slacks, unless you belong to the classic-in-beach-pajamas school.

### Yellow With Black

Wear short chamolis gloves and a leghorn hat with your short-sleeved black town dress. Wear beige with you, brown street dress, and, to make it look cooler, choose a beige silk linen type hat, and try a bunch of beige-gold wheat at the neck if the dress is plain. Beige gloves with this. All very, very ladylike.

For evening, red satin looks crisp with white chiffon or crepe. We found some lovely sandals in bright red satin with a lattice toe, and there is a charming little evening bag to match, with the same lattice work on the flap. Doekin bags in soft off-shades and pouch-shaped look new at night, as do brief velveteen jackets with enormous shoulders. The bags have rolled tops, with silver or gold kid facing, and are free from hardware of all kinds.

With your natural colored linen-flax dress, wear hand-made Viennese gloves of beige and navy, loosely woven. Or try gloves from the same source, which are half navy and half beige. This dress could have a navy belt and gloves.

Large off-white linen bags with navy or red frames look surprisingly new, if only because of their surprising squareness.

If none of these things cool you off or make you feel like a new woman, just fill your tub with cold water and stay in it an hour or so, with or without some very light fiction.

## SITUATION CALLS FOR UNITED PATRIOTIC FRONT

### No Decision Until The Pas Deferred Election

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—At the last general election which was held here last week none of the several parties running has obtained a majority.

Yesterday a Conservative caucus had rejected Premier Bracken's proposal for the immediate formation of a coalition government—at least until after the deferred election in The Pas, where Mr. Bracken is a candidate, and in Rupert's Land.

The premier's proposal which suggested a union for four years with a division of cabinet representation on the basis of five Liberal-Progressives and four Conservatives, with himself and Mr. Willis alternating as premier, had previously been approved by a Liberal-Progressive caucus.

While it was said informal overtures already had been made by the government or its intermediaries to the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation group for some form of coalition, it was believed in political circles there would be no further negotiations until after the deferred elections.

Present standing of the parties is as follows: Liberal-Progressives, 22; Conservatives, 16; C.C.F., seven; Social Credit, five; Independents, two; Communist, one; deferred, two.

"The public may judge for itself," said Premier Bracken today as he boarded a train for The Pas where he will carry on a two-week campaign. He said he was satisfied he had done the right thing in making his offer to Mr. Willis.

"Those who have the best interests of the province at heart," he continued, "will, I feel sure, agree that a coalition of the 22 government supporters with one of the other groups is necessary if we are to solve the problems confronting us. The present situation calls for a united, patriotic front."

Mr. Bracken said he had no criticism to make of the answer given by the Conservative caucus to his offer, and pointed out the Conservatives had left room for reopening negotiations after the deferred elections. In the meantime he had behind him the unanimous endorsement of the Liberal-Progressive caucus and had been authorized to continue his efforts.

Nominations in The Pas and Rupert's Land will be held Monday. W. W. Kennedy, K.C., member of Parliament for Winnipeg South Centre, will be the Conservative candidate in Rupert's Land.

### GERMANY AND EUROPE

London Morning Post: The primary issue is not between France and Germany at all, but between Germany and the rest of Europe. A pact of mutual guarantee between Great Britain, France and Germany in the West is all very well; but that is exactly what Germany desires in order that her rear may be protected in that quarter while she embarks with impunity upon a career of aggrandisement in the East and South-East. There can be very little doubt as to what are the aims of German policy. These are, in the first place, the extension of her Eastern frontiers, and secondly the establishment of a political and economic supremacy ranging from the Baltic to the Adriatic and from the Rhine to the Black Sea. If and when these aims are achieved, what will be the position of Great Britain and France in face of a Germany of unchallenged predominance and power? What would become of any temporary security they might buy with the Western Pact which is enjoined upon us as so mighty an instrument of peace?

## Indian Ritual Banishes Age

A modern utopia for women was pictured at London recently when "shots" depicting life in the palace and state schools of the Rajah of Aundh, ruling prince of one of the states in the Bombay presidency, were shown.

Shown for the first time in Europe—at the British Film Institute—the film depicting the Rajah, his family and subjects going through the ritual Surva Namaskars, which is banishing old age, pain, disease and worry from his realm.

His Ranees, aged 36, with eight healthy and beautiful children looks like a girl of 16. Another actor in this "fountain of youth" film was a 60-year-old mother of ten children, who had suffered all her life from rheumatism and superfluous fat.

She began the ritual in 1925 and is now in perfect health. "The effect on women is even more astonishing than on men," said the Rajah. "Our women age very rapidly, but now they can keep the vitality and beauty of their youth to an advanced age."

Surva Namaskars is simplicity itself, as the Rajah explained it and takes only five minutes to do. The hands are put flat on the floor in a bending position and are kept fixed throughout the cycle of ten positions. Three breaths only are taken during the cycle. No equipment of any sort is required.

He is turing farms in England, Scotland and Ireland, photographing farm processes. "I intend to educate my people by showing them these films," the Rajah said. "We shall have talkie equipment to make them perfectly clear."

He shall also take home instructional films as part of his compulsory school curriculum and to teaching swimming and other sports.

## Experts Say Spanking Function of Home

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Children may be soundly spanked at home "in a few exceptional cases," but should never be spanked at school, the majority of five New York psychologists and educators agreed today.

"It is not the function of the teacher ever to whip a child," agreed the five men and women asked to comment on the statement of Anthony Munley, Pennsylvania teacher.

"You never should whip a child. It makes him stubborn."

Parents of pupils taught by Munley in the Lagan, Pa., mining settlement protested because he "doesn't whip the kids," and told the school board he was "too lenient."
