## Troops Flee into France

Spanish government troops fled across the Bidassoa River into the French hamlet of Behobie tonight as bullets fired by their comrades and Rebel foes fighting on the outskirts of Irun ricocheted against houses on French soil. Numbers were shot down as they frantically tried to ford the 100-foot wide river.

The bridge was jammed to the guard rails with terrorized non-combatant refugees. The government soldiers dropped their rifles and bolted into the river.

The stubbornly-advancing Rebels, their red and gold flag planted atop Mount Turriarte—the last government stronghold outside Irun—surged over the crest behind a heavy barrage and leaped into the last government trench barring the way to Irun.

with the Board of Health. Mr. Jones pointed out that a closer checkup will be made on the part of the staff to ascertain those who have died and are therefore ineligible for receipt of a check.

There is a large number of new applications being received every day, both from people who have recently arrived at the age of seventy and from those who have waited until they have found out that the old age pension is a real thing. He stated that these latter who have waited before filing applications will lose one or more of the monthly payments as the pension for a person dates from the day after receiving the official application.

The staff is at present actively engaged in inquiring into pension eligibility as well as contacting all pensioners by personal call or by telephone in order to avoid improper distribution.
