Spanish government troops fled across the Bidassoa River into the French hamlet of Behobie tonight as bullets fired by their comrades and Rebel foes fighting on the outskirts of Irun richocheted against houses on French soil. Numbers were shot down as they frantically tried to ford the 100-foot wide river.


