CANZONERI AND AMBERS MEET TONIGHT

Lightweight Champ 11 to 5 Favorite — A Grudge Fight

NEW YORK, Sept. 2—World lightweight boxing champion Tony Canzoneri ruled an 11 to 5 favorite on the eve of his title defence against Lou Ambers in Madison Square Garden at 1 p.m. A.D.T., tomorrow night in a 15-round contest ballyhooed as an old fashioned grudge fight.

It seems the combatants are at each other, Canzoneri whipped Ambers a year ago in a bout for the title relinquished by Barney Ross. Now Tony's sore because he has to fight Ambers again. And Lou's sore because Tony doesn't think he rates another crack at him.

Ambers' supporters hopefully revived the argument that the veteran Canzoneri, approaching 28 years, can not go on forever and the time has come for him to give way to youth.

Ambers is five years younger than the champ and admittedly is a better scrapper than he was a year ago.

In addition to the lightweight affair, another 15-round championship bout is on the card, featuring Mike Belloise of New York, recognized by the New York State Athletic Commission as featherweight king, risking his crown against Dave Crowley, the English champion.

WOMAN GOLF STAR NETS A GOLFING HUBBY

LONDON, Sept. 3—The engagement of Joyce Wethered, ranked the greatest woman golfer in Great Britain, if not in the world, and Capt. Sir John Heathcoat-Amory, will be announced on Tuesday.

Miss Wethered is 34. Four times winner of the British women's championships, he retired from amateur competition in 1933 to become a "business woman" golfer.

In 1931 she announced her engagement to C. K. Hutchison, Scottish international golfer, but it was later broken.

Sir John, 42, served in the Great War, and is now chairman of John Heathcoat and Company. He plays golf too, but not the tournament kind. Miss Wethered is a sister of Roger Wethered, who won the British amateur championship in 1923. Among her famous golfing feats was a 4 and 3 victory over Roger in an exhibition match.

SCRIP IN ALBERTA

New York Times: The worldly will suspect a catch somewhere, and they need not look far. These so-called "prosperity certificates" are simply a form of taxation, and not very equitable taxation. Assuming that the script circulates at face value and is duly redeemed, the people of Alberta will none the less pay \$1.04 in stamp taxes for each dollar of scrip issued. No "increased purchasing power" is created; the citizens lose what the Provincial Government gains. The tax falls not on those best able to pay but merely on those who get caught with the bills on the weekly stamp day. Some persons may be able to arrange their transactions to avoid the tax regularly, while others are just as regularly caught, unless they can add the tax to their prices.

OFFICIAL VISIT AT BANFF OF LORD AND LADY TWEEDSMUIR

BANFF, Alta., Sept. 1—Plans for the official visit of His Excellency Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General of Canada to Banff on Tuesday include the laying of a wreath on the cenotaph at the Ghost town of Bankhead, five miles from Banff. Wreaths will also be placed on the Banff Cenotaph in honor of the town's war dead.

Lord Tweedsmuir and party are expected to have breakfast at the Banff Springs Hotel, following which they will inspect the school children, who ended their long summer holiday. After this the ceremonies will be held at the two cenotaphs. An escort of Royal Canadian Mounted Police will be provided and the main street of Banff will be closed to motor traffic at the time.

At Bankhead the Governor General will find only a cenotaph where there was once a thriving town of 2,000. Following the closing of the coal mines there, everything was moved away except the memorial to the war dead.
