Daring Holdup Reported to R.C.M.P.

CITY'S ELM TREES DISFIGURED BY CANKERWORM

Not in Danger of Being Killed Says Authority

Treatment Suggested
Our Trees Have Been Made Famous in Verse and Picture

Fredericton's stately elms have made the city famous in all parts of the Dominion. Bliss Carman in his poem on trees refers to "the stately elms by the river line;" this refers to the block of elm trees on Waterloo Row in the vicinity of Carman's old home. Earl Grey, when Governor-General of Canada visited Fredericton and was so impressed with the elms around the Parliament Buildings that he had a photograph taken of the large tree near St. John street at the entrance to the Parliament Building driveway. This photograph now hangs in Rideau Hall, official residence of the Governor-General at Ottawa.

During the present season the elm trees in the lower part of the city have been suffering by the onslaught of the canker worm and as a result many trees on Waterloo Row and at the lower end of George and Brunswick streets have lost most of their foliage.

Speaking in regard to the matter today to The Daily Mail, R. E. Balch of the Dominion Entomological Laboratory, says:

"The elm trees in some of the lower parts of Fredericton, particularly on Waterloo Row and around the lower ends of George and Brunswick streets, have been again attacked this year by the Fall Cankerworm (Alsophila pometaria), and the foliage badly injured. Many trees have lost more than half the leaf surface and are much disfigured.

This insect is a green caterpillar of the looper type which commences to feed as soon as the leaves come out in the spring. It is full-grown by the middle or latter part of June, when most of the feeding is done and the caterpillars are most noticeable because of their dropping from the trees to pupate in the ground. Their excrement disfigures gardens at this time. After this, however, no more damage is done as the insects go into the ground and remain there until the fall. Some time early in October, generally after the first frost, the adult moths come out of the ground to lay their eggs. The females are wingless and have to climb the trees. The males, however, are winged and can be seen mating with the females on the trunks. The eggs are laid on the branches or twigs in compact masses and the insects overwinter in this stage.

Although there is not much danger of trees being killed, they are sometimes disfigured and weakened. As a rule, damage is worst where there are considerable areas of garden with shrubbery which is favourable to pupation. Control can be obtained by banding the trees with tree tanglefoot in September, although it is not perfect, as frequently leaves blow around and make bridges over the bands. Also, the bodies of the males sometimes get stuck in them in such

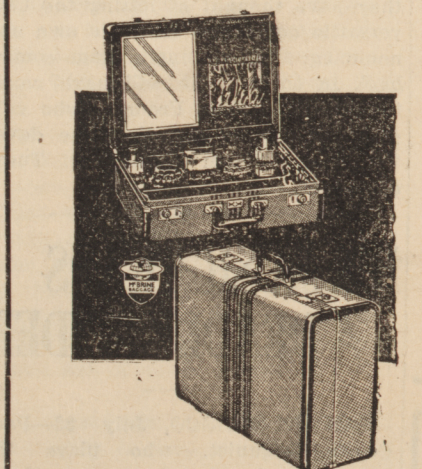
