Such conditions have been general all over this section of the province this spring. At the Experimental station here fifteen acres of grain still remain to be planted.

CITY COUNCIL TO HEAR REPORT CIVIC DELEGATION

Full Details of Report to Be Given at June Meetings Tonight

The city council will meet in their June committee and regular meetings this evening at the city hall, commencing the committee meeting at 7:30 o'clock. Mayor G. Willard Kitchen will preside. The meeting had been postponed because of the civic delegation's absence from the city.

The chief matter to come up will be the report of Mayor Kitchen and the civic delegation which made a special trip to Ottawa this week and interviewed Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Railways, securing absolute assurance that the new C.N.R. bridge would be rebuilt this year and would be up to date and modern in every detail. At the same time Hon. Mr. Howe assures that the money for the building of the bridge had already been put up. Besides the Mayor, Aldermen W. Raymond Crewdson, Warren J. Maxwell and Ray T. Forbes were in the civic delegation. A complete report is expected to be given tonight.

Several other matters will occupy the attention of the council at tonight's meeting. One will be discussion on the removal of the city yard from its present site. A suggestion has been made that the city yards be removed to a site near the Municipal Home which is regarded as suitable. This site, which is a pasture location, will be considered by the council.

There is also likely to be discussion on the recent widening of Queen street which has been completed and is proving satisfactory for traffic expansion. The suggestion that the remainder of Queen street should be similarly widened will also be before the council.

Local Construction Company Erecting Camps This Week

The Carrier Construction Company is erecting camps now about one quarter of a mile above Long's Creek where the company expects to locate its plant this year, it was stated to The Daily Mail last night by Parker H. Currier, manager of the firm. Local labor will be employed as much as possible, and the work will call for about 125 men, he said. The paving will start at the camps and run toward Allandale. The new road division will not be paved until late in the fall or next spring, to allow enough time for settling of the fills in the new road. The company is undecided as to the source of supply of crushed rock.

It is expected the company will move their camps nearer to Allandale next year.

The firm is comprised of Praker H. Currier, manager, and C. Albert Kitchen, both of this city.

The Fredericton company recently was awarded the contract for permanent paving on the highway from Allandale Railway Crossing to McKinley Ferry, a distance of 30.2 miles on Highway No. 3, the price being \$360,000.

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TO LEARN MORE OF CANNING INDUSTRY N. B.

Canning Industry Com- mittee Decided to Visit Port Elgin Factory Late in Summer—Tem- porary Holdup.

The canning industry committee, composed of smaller fruit growers, farmers and business men in this district at a meeting last night discussed further the matter of the establishment of a canning factory in this vicinity, but after considerable discussion reached the decision that the season was too far advanced to commence any operations this year. There was a feeling at the meeting, presided over by C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station here, that there was not sufficient knowledge of the business to proceed at once with any activity.

Arrangements were made, however, for a party of farmers and business men and officials of the Department of Agriculture including Hon. A. C. Taylor, the minister, and J. K. King, deputy minister, to motor to Port Elgin early in August to inspect the canning plant operated there by Fred Magee.

Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney general, who was an interested spectator at last night's meeting, and he will be one of those to make the trip to Port Elgin, being interested in the project.

H. C. Aitken, who is in charge of the fruit and vegetable processing work of the Experimental station at Kentville, N. S., also was present last night and presented figures on the cost of operating such a factory. Further information will be obtained on processing costs. Also a special visit will be paid to growers of beans, corn and strawberries in this vicinity, to ascertain their reaction to the project.

Besides the attorney general Mayor G. Willard Kitchen and J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture, were interested visitors at the meeting last night. Others present included P. S. Watson, chairman of the canning industry committee, L. C. Young, W. G. Gilman, Messrs. Carlisle of Douglas, Stanley Dunphy and Marvin Dunphy and Kenneth Campbell and Major Rouse of this city.
