amend the Act to increase the number of government appointees from three to four.

"Subsequently by Act of Legislature, an amendment was adopted, providing that the government shall appoint four directors instead of three.

"Since that time the Government has been appointing four directors so that in the present instance, there is no departure, and the present appointees: L. T. Leeman, Salisbury; E. A. Fryers, Moncton; A. J. Gaudet, St. Joseph, and the Comptroller General of the province, replace four who retire.

"In substance the foregoing explanation was given to the meeting at Moncton by J. K. King, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, but unfortunately it did not reach the public. To avoid any misunderstanding I consider it desirable to give the public the complete facts."

Salvaging of the C. N. R. Bridge to Begin Next Week

A. J. Garson, of the Garson Wrecking Company at Halifax arrived here today, accompanied by his foreman, R. Johnston. This morning they conferred with C. N. 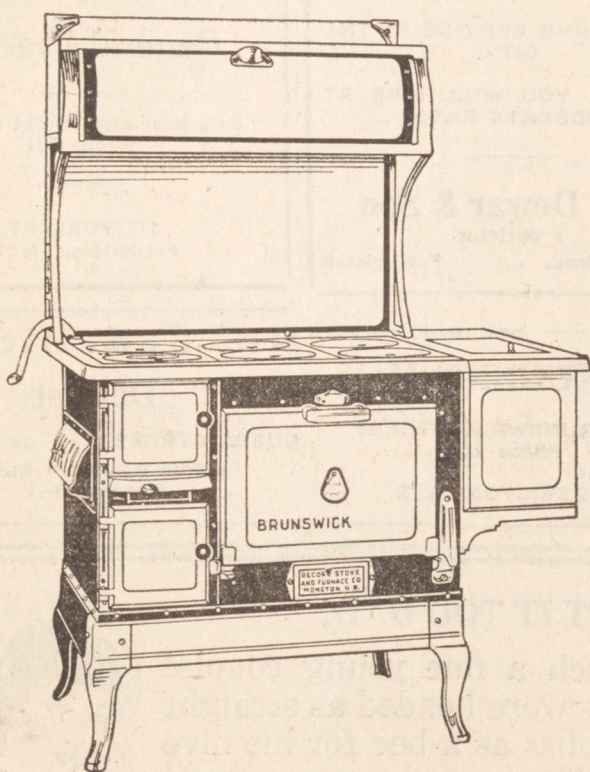
