of tests devised by Dr. Brant Clark and Dr. Neil Warren, U. S. C. psychologists.

It was an experiment in sleeplessness.

The findings won't be complete for several weeks, but Dr. Clark said this much was evident:

"The faculty which suffers most from lack of sleep is vision. The boys just couldn't see clearly, their notions of perspective were bad, their eye movements slow and their judgment of color erratic."

"Muscular co-ordination was low, tests of writing, aiming a gun and hitting a nail on the head showing a great of accuracy."

"But there were periods when the boys seemed to make brief comebacks to alertness, something like 'second wind'."

"The longer the boys stayed awake the more irritable they became."

He said the students, Frank Friedel, Fred Thompson and Lebaron Stockford, had to be watched "to keep them from flying at each other."
