FORTY MEN ARE TAKEN FROM THE NOONAN CAMPS

Absorbed by C. P. R. For Maintenance Work

New Employment Plan

Ultimate Aim is To Do Away With the Relief Camps

The first step in the federal government's plan of returning those unemployed single men in relief camps to regular employment was evidenced in this vicinity yesterday when forty men of the Noonan camps in Sunbury county were taken onto the payroll of the Canadian Pacific Railways. These men along with others at a later date will be gradually absorbed on the maintenance gangs of the railways until by Dominion Day it is hoped to have the relief camps depleted of unemployed single men, and the camps abolished.

Recently in the federal parliament supplementary estimates provided for loans to the railways totalling \$6,412,400 to enable them to pay their share of cost of maintenance work which is designed chief to put the relief camp workers back at regular employment for wages.

According to a report today it is planned that about two hundred men in all will be taken from the relief camps before the end of May.

These workers will be put to work at graveling and general maintenance work along the railways in this province. In view of the spring freshet conditions this should supply these men with lots of work for several months.

Estate Probated

Estate of Late Howard Richards, Admitted to Probate This Week—Widow and Children Benefit

The estate of the late Howard Richards, prominent citizen, whose death occurred recently in this city, was admitted to probate this week. The personal estate amounts to \$53,000 and insurance \$25,000. Real estate was less than \$1,000. The bulk of the estate goes to the widow and children.

Rev. Dr. Watson Dead at Boston

Word was received here this afternoon of the death at Boston, Mass., of Rev. Dr. Robert A. Watson, brother of P. S. Watson of Devon and H. A. Watson of this city. Rev. Mr. Watson who was well known here in his boyhood and college days, was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and received his doctor's degree from that institution several years ago. Rev. Dr. Watson was considered one of the leading Presbyterian ministers in the United States. He was president of the Eastern New England Lord's Day League. His death followed just one year the death of his sister, Mrs. George A. Jamer, North Devon. He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Wm. Kesson, North Devon; Mrs. A. H. Barker, a United Church missionary now at Wonsan, Korea; and Miss Mary A. Watson, of Rhode Island Hospital. Another brother, David Watson, resides at Cayuga, Ontario.

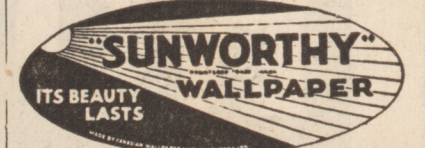

BLACKVILLE SUP. SCHOOL DEMOLISHED

Damage is Estimated at \$10,000 in Early Morning Blaze

Pupils Number 220

Harold Bearisto of This City Principal of School

The Superior school at Blackville, Northumberland county, burned to the ground in the early hours this morning, with a loss estimated between \$5,000 and \$10,000. The building was a two-storey, four-room structure housing 220 pupils with grades from one to eleven.

Harold Bearisto, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bearisto, of this city, principal of the school, had arrived at his home here last night for the week-end and was informed this morning of the catastrophe. He told the Daily Mail this morning that the origin of the fire was not known. It is not yet known either whether the school will be rebuilt at once.

The fire completely demolished the school building with complete loss of school books and equipment. No other buildings were burned and there was no casualties.

The janitor, Arthur MacRae, who lives a short distance from the school was the first to notice the fire, the building being in a mass of flames when he discovered it.

A meeting of the recently formed Miramichi Teachers' Association was to have been held this afternoon in the Blackville Superior School.

Inspector Titus who was at Blackville yesterday is today investigating the fire. Miss Bessie J. Parent of Douglas is a teacher in the school.

It is learned today that efforts may be made to secure a hall for the remainder of the school term.

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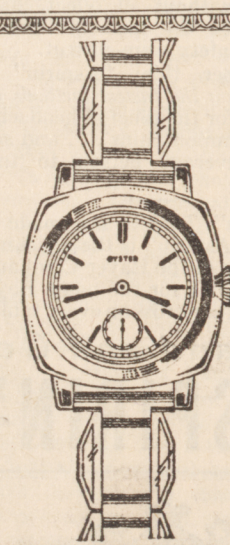
