## Japan Taking Stones From Wall

PEIPING, China, May 15 — The Chinese press charged yesterday that bricks from China's Great Wall, one of the wonders of the world and long regarded as the mightiest achievement of human manual labor, are going into Japanese military barracks.

Because Japanese soldiers are taking the bricks from the wall to build army barracks at Kupeikow, the reports said, the ancient structure seems in danger of at least partial disintegration.

Half a century and the labor of nearly 1,000,000 men is said to have been required to create the massive wall which, with its branches, worms across the mountains for almost three thousand miles.

A workman, removing bricks from the wall yesterday, found one inscribed with four Chinese characters meaning: "Quick Repairs, Early Departure".

MONTREAL, May 15—Hon. P. J. Veniot, member of Parliament for Gloucester and former postmaster general, entered hospital here tonight. He was taken suddenly ill at Ottawa today and came here this evening. Nature of his illness was not disclosed.
