JOSEPH CAMPBELL MOOSE RIVER MINE RESCUER KILLED

STELLARTON, N. S., May 14—The Allan shaft of the Stellarton coal mine in Nova Scotia claimed a victim yesterday in the death of Joseph Campbell, who was prominent in the rescue of Dr. D. E. Robertson and Alfred Scadding from the Moose River gold mine.

A roaring 'coal trip' a string of loaded cars returning to the surface, struck Joseph Campbell, 200 feet from the shaft entrance, killing the 27-year-old miner almost instantly.

With a group of other Stellarton miners, Campbell was on a fishing trip near Moose River when news of the collapse of the gold mine there and the entombing of Dr. D. E. Robertson, Alfred Scadding and Herman Magill, reached them.

"Boys", we'll have to go", Campbell told them. The party reached Moose River almost at the same time as did five Stellarton Draegermen led by Louis "Billy" Baudoux. All offered their services for rescue work.

FIVE CONVICTS GAIN FREEDOM IN STOLEN CAR

MCALLISTER, Oklahoma, May 14—Twenty-four convicts broke loose with startling savagery from the Oklahoma State Penitentiary yesterday used a foreman as a shield, then killed him and dumped his body from an automobile while ten of their band were being shot down by guards.

Six of the escaping prisoners were recaptured unhurt. Five other desperadoes got away in the motor car, taking two guards as hostages. A lone convict used an ice truck to escape.

Of the ten convicts wounded one was first reported dead, but it later was established that he was only critically shot.

The convicts drew knives and seized C. D. Powell, foreman of the prison brickyard to which "dangerous" inmates were assigned. Using him to shield themselves, they forced guards at the prison gates and on the walls to throw down their arms.

ARE NAMED FOR CAN. UNIVERSITIES

MONTREAL, Que., May 15—Named for Canadian Universities, six new 12 section, 2 double-bedroom sleeping cars are being placed in service between Montreal and Chicago and Montreal and Detroit over Canadian National lines. The first of the series, bearing the name of Dalhousie University (Halifax), has already been put into service. Names of the others are Mount Allison (Sackville, N. B.), Acadia (Wolfville, N. S.), Laval (Montreal), Queens (Kingston, Ontario), Victoria (Toronto, Ontario). Mattresses are of cushions rubber material, which is also used under the car carpets. Every possible facility for the comfort of passengers is provided, even to reclining seats in the sleeping car sections, while the colors and lighting arrangements are most attractive.

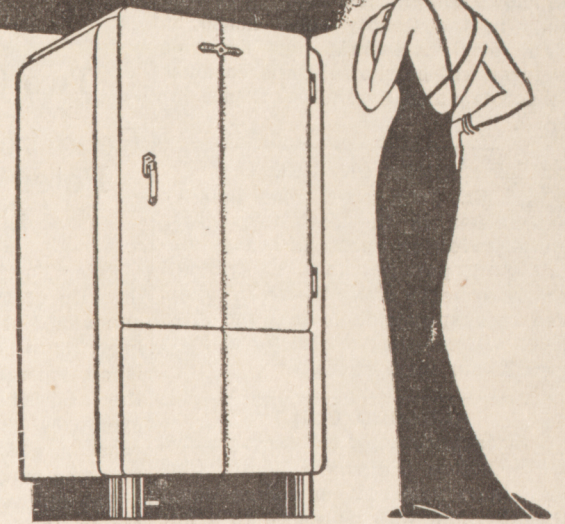
