

### Killing Our Province

Delegates to the 25th convention of New Brunswick Women's Institutes are urged by Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, to use their influence to have the farmers of the province use more home-grown products. He was speaking at the banquet arranged for the convention by the Fredericton, Devon, New Maryland, Lincoln and Lower Kingsclear Institutes.

Mr. Taylor also expressed the belief that more dairying products should be manufactured in the province and thought that the women's organizations such as the institutes and the various agricultural societies and other farmers' associations could work in closer co-operation for the benefit of all concerned.

Yesterday morning Mayor Kithen told these same ladies that if every woman in New Brunswick were to buy twenty-five dollars' worth of goods manufactured in this province the unemployment situation would be relieved. This good advice given by practical men to a body of intelligent women like the members of the Women's Institute should bear fruit. Such bodies as the Women's Institute can accomplish much along the lines suggested by Hon. Mr. Taylor and by Mayor Kitchen.

Millions of dollars are going out of New Brunswick each year for products which the farmers should produce themselves. More millions are going out to purchase goods no better in their various lines than our manufacturers are turning out in this province.

As we have pointed out many times this money is going out through the mail order route and in other ways, millions each year. It is going to enrich outsiders. This money will not come back. It will not help our merchant, our manufacturer, our farmer or our workmen. The policy is worse than short-sighted-it is almost criminal. It is a policy which is against New Brunswick and all its interests. Ladies of the Women's Institute! Where do you stand in regard to this matter of sending money away and killing our country? This has been and is the curse of New Brunswick. Are you as individuals a party to it? Do you wish these conditions to continue?


