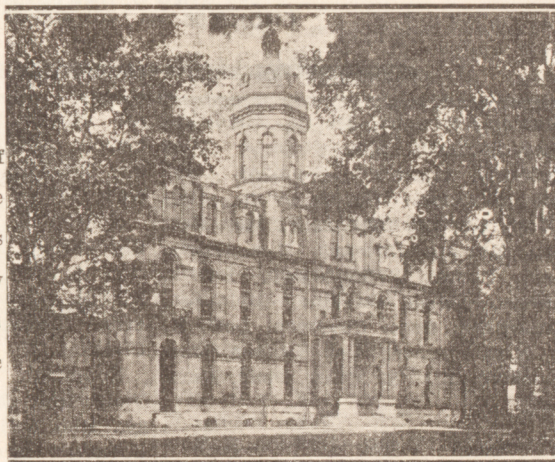

ment. It is hoped that in a short time creamery butter will be sold on a graded basis.

Herd Improvement Association
This work is to assist farmers in weeding out their low producers and to raise the average production of as large a percentage of our herds as possible.

Field Crops
The chief objects of the Division is to encourage the best cultivating methods.

To use the best seed possible.
To increase the production of Timothy and Clover seed.
To improve the pasture for our live stock.

To particularly increase the growing of home grown grains.
The Department assists the farmers in obtaining ground limestone, an important item in our soil management.

The increased demands on this Department has made it necessary to increase the staff in order to keep up with the work.

Canning Crops
There is a very definite demand for investigation and advice in regard to the production and processing of canning crops and the Department is endeavoring to meet this request this year in order that we may make a beginning towards supplying our needs in this respect.

Swing production is an important phase of the industry and one of the right lights of our activities. Since the inception of the Swine Policy in 1935, a great deal of activity has been in evidence and with the Federal Department co-operating, much can be expected in this important branch.

At the present time New Brunswick is importing a great quantity of pork and pork products and it is our hope that in a few years, we will be self-supporting and hope to be on an export basis.

Poultry
This branch is also an important one, by reason of the fact that if properly carried on, it has been one of the few bright spots in New Brunswick agriculture. The Department has done extensive work and has promoted the blood testing of poultry. To

Fruit Growing
The quality of New Brunswick fruit is exceptionally high and when offered not only on our own markets but on the British market, as well they often command a premium. The New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association is doing a wonderful work and the Department through the Horticultural Division is giving the fruit growers every assistance possible.
