

### News Briefs

**RIVER DROPS LOWER**  
A further fall of five inches was recorded in the St. John river last night, making in all about twenty inches within the past three days. Despite the recent general rain fall the river continued to drop today.

**TOOK SUDDENLY ILL**  
Mrs. Gilbert Alcott of Lowell, Mass., arrived here yesterday morning by automobile, being called to see her sister, Mrs. Benjamin Edmondson of Keswick who took suddenly ill at the home of Mrs. Wesley Manzer on Westmorland Street, when she stopped off in this city for a short visit en route to her home.

**IS A GRADUATE**  
Among the sixteen graduates receiving degrees at the convocation of St. Mary's College at Halifax yesterday, were two New Brunswick students. One was John F. Corcoran of Moncton, who received his bachelor of science degree, and the other, Clarence J. Grant of Belledune, N. B., who received his bachelor of arts degree.

**MOTOR VEHICLE VIOLATION**  
As a result of the recent checkup by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police on violators of the motor vehicle laws of the province, a number of offenders are scheduled to appear in the Fredericton and Devon police courts within the next few days. Yesterday one man from Kingsclear was fined \$20 and costs or thirty days in jail when he appeared before the local police magistrate for such a violation.

**CITIZENS TAKE NOTICE!**  
Daylight Saving Time goes into effect for the summer months at midnight on Saturday in the city of Saint John and the city of Moncton. At that time clocks will be set ahead one hour in those places. The daylight time ends in Saint John on September 26. Merchants would do well to note the time changes in those two places so that the times will not conflict.

**PAVING TENDERS CLOSE**  
Tenders for the paving of 420 miles of hardsurfaced highway in this province closed yesterday afternoon at five o'clock but no announcements in connection with contract awards are expected until next week. Considerable study on the part of the engineers will be required to determine which types of paving will be to the best advantage. Yesterday a delegation from Charlotte county waited upon Premier Dymally in connection with county matters, especially with regard to fishing. No government meeting is scheduled for today. At least thirty contractors, or representatives of well known contracting firms, mostly from Toronto and Upper Canada swarmed about the Queen Hotel last evening.

**PREMIER'S BROTHER HERE**  
R. W. Dymally of Boston is visiting his brother Premier A. A. Dymally this week. He is a guest at the Queen Hotel. He expects to leave with the premier for Buctouche over the weekend.

**BEARS NUMEROUS**  
Twelve bears were reported to have disrupted the camp routine at the road construction camp at Monahan Brook on the Quarryville end of the new road from Plaster Rock to Quarryville. Three of the bears have been dispatched and the other nine are still available for hunters. The bears tore tarpaper from the camp and three of them effected an entrance through the roof and took provisions from the camp.

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### INDIAN HOSPITAL TO BE ESTABLISHED AT NORTH DEVON

Miss Eva Dedham Will Be Placed in Charge

#### New Indian School

#### Social Betterment is Proposed For Indians

It is understood on good authority that a movement is on foot to establish an hospital on the Indian reserve at Devon for the treatment of the Indians who require medical attention. This hospital will be under the direction of the doctor assigned by the Department of Indian Affairs to care for the Indians. Miss Eva Dedham, a bright young Indian maiden, will be engaged to take charge of the proposed hospital. She will also be engaged by the department to do other social service work amongst the Indians in this vicinity. Miss Dedham, who is a young woman possessed of a good business education and of more than ordinary ability as a singer and reader, has appeared at concerts put on by the York and Sunbury Historical Society. The idea of having her do social work amongst her own people seems to meet with popular approval.

It is proposed to move the present Indian school to the Indian reserve and to use it as an hospital, and to erect a new school at Devon. There are those who think that the best plan would be to allow the present school, which is a comparatively new one, to remain as it is and to erect a new hospital, which could be proceeded with at once.

The present Indian school in Devon has about thirty-five pupils under the direction of an efficient teacher, Mrs. H. A. McElligott, who has had an excellent record in the public schools and who has been most highly recommended by leading educational authorities in the province. The pupils in this school are doing very satisfactory work.

It is only a few years ago that the Federal government purchased a tract of land on the hillside back of Devon and erected a large number of neat dwellings of the bungalow type for the use of the Indians. The Indians were removed from the old site which contained some very poor shacks, none of which were in a proper condition for habitation.

Speaking to The Daily Mail this morning Lee McCutcheon, Indian agent, stated he had no official notice of any change in connection with the Indian School building. It is probable if any social centre building is erected that it will be an entirely new building on the Indian Reserve. Mr. McCutcheon has been doing a considerable amount of work in providing for the disposal of Indian products, and in seeing also that the homes on the Reserve are kept in a strictly sanitary condition.

### RADICAL CHANGES ADVOCATED FOR U. N. B. COURSE

Influential Men Believe College Should Extend Usefulness

#### Adult, Mass Education

#### This Follows the Lines of Most Modern Universities

A few days ago during the course of an address to the graduating class of the University of New Brunswick, Premier Dymally stated that in his opinion and in the opinion of others who were more in touch with the educational world, that the time had come when the university should become the medium of mass enlightenment and adult education. He pointed out the great work that was done in the province of Nova Scotia in respect to adult education by one of the universities in that province. This work was doing much to cure the economic ills which exist and he believed that the same thing could be done here. He hoped to see the day when a wider service would be rendered by the university and he believed that a state university supported by the taxpayer should reach out to the tradesmen and artisans and the farmer and make its influence felt in the hamlets and under the humble roofs of the farmer and the artisan.

The remarks made by Premier Dymally were in a manner endorsed by Mr. Justice Harrison of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. It is understood that an effort will be made almost immediately and before the opening of the next academic year at U.N.B. to have the "old college on the hill" extend its usefulness and
