G. BRUCE BURPEE IS ASST GENERAL PASSENGER AGENT

MONTREAL, Sept. 14—G. Bruce Burpee, district passenger agent, Canadian Pacific Railway, Toronto, will, on October 1st become assistant general passenger agent with headquarters in Montreal, according to an announcement here today by G. E. Carter, general passenger agent. Mr. Burpee will be succeeded in Toronto by C. B. Andrews, at present district passenger agent at Saint John, N. B. Further changes include the appointment of H. C. James, general agent at Atlanta, Ga., to the position of district passenger agent, Saint John, succeeding Mr. Andrews, and the transfer of W. A. Shackelford, at present general agent, Pittsburgh, Pa., to the general agency at Atlanta, succeeding Mr. James. The Pittsburgh agency will be placed under R. F. Lyman, city passenger agent.

Experience both in Canada and the United States and a wide knowledge of the needs of the travelling public make Mr. Burpee's promotion to his new position particularly appropriate. Mr. Burpee joined the company's service as a ticket clerk in Saint John, in July, 1904, and prior to going to Toronto in December, 1928, served as travelling passenger agent with headquarters at Montreal, and as a general agent at Cleveland. Mr. Andrews will take with him to Toronto knowledge of the needs of the travelling public gained in both western and eastern Canada. He joined the company's service as a clerk at Souris, Man., in May 1910, and has steadily advanced to increasing responsibility since that time.

In becoming district passenger agent at Saint John, H. C. James returns to his native city. He joined the service there in October 1914, and prior to becoming general agent at Atlanta, was successively promoted to positions at Quebec City, Kansas City, St. Louis and Dallas, Texas.

Mr. Shackelford, who succeeds Mr. James at Atlanta, has had all his experience in the United States. He entered the service in August 1913, as a clerk in the Boston office, and has risen steadily to his present responsible position.

FARM IMPLEMENTS, MACHINERY

Substantial increases in the import of cream separators, harvesters, combination harvesters and threshers, ploughs and parts, threshing machine separators and internal combustion traction engines for farm purposes were responsible for the increase of \$441,956 in the import of farm machinery in July. The July import was valued at \$1,036,411 as compared with \$594,455 last year. The total from the United States was \$974,834 and from the United Kingdom \$24,375.

PROF. HOLLIS LINDSAY DIED AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, Sept. 14—Prof. J. Hollis Lindsay, 51-year-old musician who refused to let blindness handicap him in his career, died Saturday while vacationing in Lunenburg county. He was head of the music department of the Halifax School for the Blind and a former member of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Born in Woodstock, N. B., Prof. Lindsay graduated from the Halifax School for the Blind and from the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, where he was gold medalist of his class.

After some years with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, he was appointed head of the music department at Ricker Classical Institute, Houlton, Me., and ten years later, in 1920, became the head of that department at the Halifax institution. He received his licentiate from Trinity College of Music, London, England, last June.

Musical columnist for Halifax newspapers, his reviews of New York Philharmonic Orchestra programmes received wide attention.

A funeral service was held at All Saints' Cathedral here and burial was at Houlton, Maine.
