INVENTORY FOREST RESOURCES
M. B. Morrison, assistant to J. C. Veness officer in charge of the Maritime division of the Dominion Forest Service, left this week for Halifax where he will conduct an inventory into Nova Scotia forestry resources. He was accompanied by W. G. I. Creighton, chief forester for Nova Scotia, who was visiting here over the past week-end. Mr. Morrison has only recently returned from a trip to Syracuse, N. Y., where he attended a meeting of the eastern section of the American Society of Forest Engineers, and also was present at the school of Harvard forestry.

IS SENT UP FOR TRIAL
Joseph Trombley, of Penniac, was sent up for trial at the next sitting of the York Circuit court opening on September 22, when he appeared before acting police magistrate Arthur McK. Limerick yesterday afternoon in the local police court, on two charges. One charge is that of having care and control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor and also committing grievous bodily injury to William McGloin, of Marysville. On Thursday night of last week Trombley, while driving his Ford car, struck a motorcycle driven by McGloin on the Nashwaak road, and the latter is in the hospital now with a broken leg and other injuries. The Penniac man was arrested by R.C.M.P. officers.

Dan'l Bannister Appeal Dismissed

APPEAL COURT HANDED DOWN JUDGMENT TODAY

Berry Mills Rd. Youth Will Hang For Pacific Jet. Murder

In the case of the King versus Daniel Robert Bannister which was appealed for the second time and considered in the Appeal Court this morning at the September sitting of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, was dismissed. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter gave the order of judgment, which ran as follows: "In a matter involving such grave consequences as the dismissal of this appeal, we feel inclined to adopt the language of the court in the case of Betts and Ridley (Supra) and say that there may be a distinction to be drawn between the guilt of the two brothers and those who have power, which this court has not, may consider any steps which may rightly be taken in this case making a distinction between them."

After handing down the judgment in the Bannister case, court adjourned until Friday, September 18 at 10.30 o'clock. No other judgments were handed down today. Court was in session only a short time this morning. Chief Justice Baxter, and Mr. Justices Grimmer and Harrison comprised the court.

The date for Daniel Bannister's hanging has not yet been set.

No Contagious Cases in Hospital; a Busy Month

The isolation ward at the Victoria Public Hospital has been closed as at the present time there are no contagious cases, it was learned at the meeting of the Victoria Hospital board last night. W. G. Clark, M.P., vice-president, was in the chair in the absence of J. A. Reid, the president. Others present were L. S. Morrison, C. E. Boone, Mrs. D. J. Shea, Miss Areta Gerow, Councillor Manzer, Warden Howard Cameron, Dr. A. F. Van Wart, and F. I. Haviland. The superintendent's report showed the following for the month:

Patients in hospital at beginning of month, 53; patients admitted during month, 115; patients discharged during month, 131; patients in hospital at end of month, 37; medical cases, admitted, 6; surgical cases admitted, 95; obstetrical cases admitted, 7; births, 6; deaths, 8; major operations, 33; minor operations, 52; x-ray examinations, 72; x-ray treatments, 6; maximum number of patients in one day, 53; minimum number of patients in one day, 35. The month was unusually busy for operations and x-ray. The Ladies' Hospital Aid supplied slip covers for a number of chairs.

The Class 1 race, a half-mile on the Fredericton race track, for boys of 100 pounds and under, was won by Raymond Savage in one minute and 17 seconds. Vernon Olive was second and Jack Morgan and Dick Myhrall tied for third. Class 2, a half-mile for boys above 100 pounds, was won by Bud Lynch in 1:12, with Jack Miles, Howard Lawrence and James Mazur all placing second, third and fourth.
