## Want More Space For Expansion of the Library

That further space be provided for the expansion of the Legislative library was recommended by the Library committee yesterday. The report was presented by the chairman, F. M. Tweedie, M.P.P. for Northumberland. The report stated that the committee had investigated the matter with regard to the library and had found that books, publications and records were scattered in various sections of the legislative buildings and should be properly taken care of and recorded.

"This is absolutely necessary if our library is to be brought up to a proper standard and our books properly recorded," the report said. The report also stated that two more volumes of the Domesday Book were found under a lot of old books in the vault and recommendation was made that these be placed with other volumes in the U.N.B. library for safe-keeping. It was also recommended that all provincial newspapers be subscribed to by the library and that the files of the old newspapers kept in the public works department be transferred to the library for reference purposes.

Attorney General Hon. J. B. McNair, Mr. Justice Richards, Dr. P. A. McGrand, M.P.P. for Queens, P. C. Robinson, Mrs. J. L. Neville, Miss Mabel Sterling and Miss Doreen M. Harper were recommended as members of the purchasing committee for the present year.

The committee recommended the usual appropriation of \$200 for library purposes for the present year and an increase of \$250 a year to the librarian's salary.

Miss Harper reported to the committee on the archives of the province, which, she said, are in a worse condition than those of any province in the Dominion, and something must be done to preserve these records.

## WANTS STABILIZATION

Senator B. Frank Smith of East Florenceville, who is in the capital this week gives his endorsement to the scheme put forward by Guy C. Porter of Andover, respecting the utilization of surplus of New Brunswick potato crop for the manufacture of motor fuel. Senator Smith says it is worth a trial if the initial cost is not too great, and if it will stabilize the potato industry. He points out, however, that many difficulties exist here which do not exist in the countries of Europe which Mr. Porter visited. "The price of fifty cents per barrel for potatoes would not be very attractive to our farmers," he said. He would like to see the price of potatoes continue to hold but feared the farmers would over-plant again, driving the price down. Senator Smith is interested in any plan which would stabilize the potato crop in this province. But it is necessary to regulate and control the acreage he said. He anticipates that the price of potatoes will reach \$3 per barrel shortly but it isn't likely to stay at that peak long.

## Work On Official Adoption Papers

Official adoption papers for little Betty Lake, eight-months-old orphan of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Lake, who were murdered at Pacific Junction, will be taken out within two weeks. Mr. and Mrs. Edward Cuthbertson of Barker's Point, now have the child in their possession. Mr. Cuthbertson, who was in The Daily Mail office yesterday said that he was in touch with J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., and that the latter was drawing up the papers which would change the child's name to Cuthbertson. A large number of people have already called at the home of the Cuthbertsons to see the Lake baby. Mr. Cuthbertson is especially proud of the child and says it is a "good" baby.

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## COURTESY TO TOURISTS IN JAPAN

HONOLULU, April 23 — Four hundred passengers who landed here today from the Canadian Pacific world cruise in the Empress of Britain told a story of Japanese courtesy. For some years tourists have occasionally and quite unwittingly infringed the Japanese fortification law by taking photographs of fortified zones. No trouble has arisen from these accidental violations, except in the case of two American aviators some years ago, but the Japanese have been distressed at the necessity of confiscating the films. They are receiving the best of care and are also receiving nourishment in small quantities. It is expected to be some days, probably not before the last of the week or the first of next week before the two men are conveyed to Halifax. Then they will go back home.

Mrs. Robertson who was visibly affected at an early hour this morning when informed that her husband had come through, and Mrs. Scadding, are with their husbands, and are spending as much time there as the conditions will allow.

Moose River is today a deserted spot except in the vicinity of the improvised hospital where the two now famous patients are located. At this point cars frequently stop and curious people gaze upon the little hospital.
