Want More Space For Expansion of the Library

That further space be provided for the expansion of the Legislative library was recommended by the Library committee yesterday. The report was presented by the chairman, F. Tweedie, M.P.P. for Northumbermittee had investigated the matter with regard to the library and had records were scattered in various sections of the legislative buildings and should be properly taken care of and recorded.

"This is absolutely necessary if our library is to be brought up to a proper standard and our books profound under a lot of old books in the vault and recommendation was made that these be placed with other volumes in the U.N.B. library for safekeeping. It was also recommended that all provincial newspapers be subscribed to by the library and that the fyles of the old newspapers kept in the public works department be ransferred to the library for refernce purposes

Attorney General Hon. J. B. Mc-Nair, Mr. Justice Richards, Dr. F. A. McGrand, M.P.P. for Queens, P. Robinson, Mrs. J. L. Neville, Miss Mabel Sterling and Miss Doreen M. Harper were recommended as members of the purchasing committee for the present year.

The committee recommended the usual appropriation of \$200 for library purposes for the present year and an increase of \$250 a year to the librarian's salary.

Miss Harper reported to the committee on the archives of the province, which, she said, are in a worse condition than those of any province in the Dominion, and something must be done to preserve these records.

WANTS STABILIZATION

Senator B. Frank Smith of East this week gives his endorsement to the scheme put forward by Guy C. Porter of Andover, respecting the utilization of surplus of New Brunswick potato crop for the manufacture of motor fuel. Senator Smith says it is worth a trial if the initial cost is not too great, and if it will stabilize the potato industry. He points out however, that many difficulties exist here which do not exist in the countries of Europe which Mr. Porter risited. "The price of fifty cents per barrel for potatoes would not be very attractive to our farmers," he said.


