SITTING AT BATHURST

The New Brunswick Board of Review under the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement is sitting at Bathurst this week. The Board is composed of Mr. Justice C. D. Richards of this city, W. A. McLellan, A. C. Parker and Paul C. Quinn, registrar. Several applications are being heard.

BOY SCOUT CERTIFICATES

Prof. R. B. Pugh, Provincial Boy Scout field worker, this afternoon at the Provincial Normal School, presented certificates to Boy Scouts who successfully took courses in Scout leadership. Dr. H. H. Hagerman, principal, acted as chairman, the presentations being made in the auditorium of the school.

A slight roof fire occurred yesterday at the residence of Elmer Close on Aberdeen street. No damage resulted, the firemen being able to extinguish the blaze without difficulty. A fire occurred at the home of Herbert Cole on Saunders street, which also resulted in no damage.

ATTRACTING ATTENTION

The sixteen purebred Percheron mares which are quartered at the Fredericton exhibition grounds, are attracting a great deal of attention from citizens, many of whom have visited the stalls at the exhibition grounds to see them. The new stock have been acquired by the provincial government in conjunction with their new horse-breeding policy.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR N. B.

It is rumored that the Old Chamcook sardine factory in Charlotte County have been purchased from the Booths Fisheries and will be converted into a new industry for the manufacture of excelsior from popplewood, leading to the manufacture of wallboard. The original cost of this enterprise was over a million dollars. The factory is situated a short distance beyond St. Andrew's. The reported buyer was not definitely ascertained today.

SUNBURY GETS POWER BACK

S. R. Weston, chief engineer of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission who was here yesterday, stated that the Commission has restored its service to the Sunbury County area surrounding Fredericton Junction and Rusagonis. This particular district had been without power for over a month, since the destruction of the commission's submarine cable which connected with Devon sub-station. The damage was done during the spring freshets.

ELECTED OFFICERS

The U. N. B. Engineering Society met this morning and elected officers for next year. They were as follows: Honorary president, Dr. John Stephens; president, Donald Ross of Saint John; vice president, Gerald Campbell of this city; secretary-treasurer, H. E. P. Wilson of Rimouski, Quebec. At a meeting of the athletic association today it was decided to have an inter-class track meeting on May 12. At that time selection will be made of the team to meet Mount Allison this spring.

ST. GEORGE'S DAY

Today is St. George's Day on the calendar and is generally a day of anniversaries for the English people. Throughout the world Englishmen and members of St. George's Society are observing the anniversary of their patron saint. It is also a celebration for sailor veterans who recall the successful attack on the German stronghold at Zeebrugge, eighteen years ago in the World War. Also today is the three hundred and seventy second anniversary of the birth of William Shakespeare.

FISHING PARTIES ARRIVE

Judge Henry A. Dodge and Dr. John C. Bekels, both of Littleton, New Hampshire, arrived here last evening and will enjoy a week's fishing at the Mouth of Cain's river. Thomas Moor of Worcester, Mass., arrived here yesterday and also went to the Cain's river for a week's fishing. The two parties are being guided by Charles Wade of Penniac. Fishing there is reported to be very good at the present time. The various parties which have been fishing in that vicinity have caught several record-sized fish, weighing all the way from fifteen to twenty pounds. The Houghton party are expected here on Saturday from Corning, N. Y., and will proceed to the mouth of the Cain's river for fishing.

PUBLIC ACCTS. DISCUSS MATTER OF GOV'T CARS

Advocated That Gov't Cars Be Less Expensive

Report Drafted

Chairman Doucet Says Purchase of Trucks Be Curtailed

J. A. Doucet, chairman of the Public Accounts Committee read a draft of the committee report in the Public Accounts Committee meeting at the House this morning. The matter of government cars being used for other business than government business was discussed. J. A. Doucet said that cars bought by the government should be cheap cars. It was suggested that all government cars should have some crest on the sides of the cars to designate they are government cars.

Mr. Doucet said that he was informed the policy of the last government was to do away with the purchase of trucks. He believed that this policy should be advocated to a certain extent.

Some of the recommendations in the drafted report were:

That accounts for road expenditure be paid more promptly, that total salaries and expenses received by employees be shown in public accounts in one place; that economy be exercised in salaries of employees; that the revisors of various municipalities paid on a more equitable basis, that letters be written wherever possible instead of telephone calls; that newspapers be subscribed to by only one department; that granting of special warrants be curtailed; that over-expenditures and purchases of road machinery for election purposes be discontinued.

The committee also considered expenditures on roads and bridges, provincial hospital and motor vehicle law administration.

J. A. Doucet pointed out that about \$150,000 was spent for salaries, supplies and other expenditures for government garages last year.

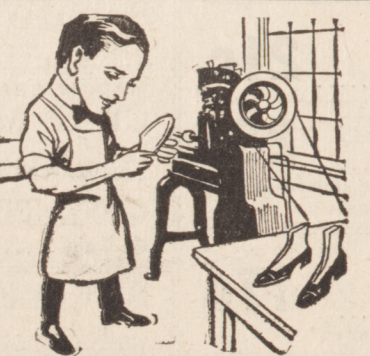

HOUSE SPEEDS UP IN ORDER TO PROROGUE

Held Its First Morning Session Today — Saint John Insurance Matters.

In order to facilitate the matter of proroguing before the close of the present week the N. B. Legislature held its first morning session of the present term this morning. The whole morning session was taken up with discussion on a sub-section of a bill respecting the levying and assessing of taxes in the city of Saint John. The sub-section referred to the assessing of license fees in connection with insurance companies which had no resident agent or broker in Saint John.

W. W. V. Foster, M.P.P. for Kings, in discussing the matter referred to the malorder insurance companies which he said were taking considerable money out of the city and also made a reference to what he called "booblegging insurance." Dr. W. M. Jenkins, M.P.P. for Queens, seconded the adoption of the sub-section.

This was opposed by C. H. Blakeny, M.P.P. of Moncton, on the ground that it was an attempt to shut out mutual and non-tariff insurance companies. Fraser Keay, M.P.P. for Charlotte, agreed with Mr. Blakeny and said that the people of the province were much benefitted by mutual and non-tariff companies.

Mr. Foster then amended his motion so that five per cent instead of ten per cent would be the tax imposed. Hon. Mr. McNair suggested that the proposed amendment be sent back to the Municipalities committee. He thought that the fight of the insurance companies should not be taken up at a committee of the whole House. Finally a vote was taken on Mr. Foster's amendment which was declared lost. The House then took recess until three o'clock this afternoon. F. H. Copp, M.P.P. for Westmorland, was in the chair.

RESCUE MINER PLAYED HOCKEY IN FREDERICTON

Joe Nearing Was With F'ton Millionaires in 1932

Well Known Here

Tells in Press Story of Finding Men in a Joking Mood

Fredericton people and particularly those hockey supporters who remember the Millionaire hockey team which represented the capital city in 1932, will learn with interest that the Joseph Nearing, Stellarton Draegerman, whose name appeared over an exclusive press story in this morning's newspapers, was none other than "Joe" Nearing who cavorted on the front line of the Fredericton Millionaire hockey club.

"Joe" Nearing made many friends while in this city and was of a quiet likable personality as well as being a good hockey player. His part in the rescue work at Moose River mine in the early hours of this morning was a noble one. "Joe" was the third miner to reach Dr. Robertson and Scadding.

In his press story "Joe" tells of wriggling through to the two men and finding them both "sitting up laughing." Joe says both men were tickled to death, and both were in a joking mood.

Nearing came to this city along with "Joe" Beaton, Hymie McArthur and others in the year 1932.
