"massacres" by the Spanish insurgents.

Anxiety continued over the question of just what blew up the Spanish warship Miguel de Cervantes in Cartagena harbor over the week-end. Some reports asserted an internal explosion and not a foreign torpedo, as claimed by the Spanish government, caused the damage. The commander of H.M.S. Glowworm, in the harbor at the time, was reported by naval sources to have reported to the admiralty that the explosions were mysterious, but that the hole torn in the vessel could have been made by a torpedo.

Eden's statement in the House of Commons follows:

"The policy of His Majesty's government is to take no part in the Spanish war and to give no assistance to either side in the struggle. In pursuance of this policy His Majesty's government, however, have been considering the importation of arms into Spain by sea and the problems arising from this.

"His Majesty's government have not so far accorded belligerent rights at sea to either side in the Spanish struggle and they have no present intention of according such rights. His Majesty's ships will, if necessary, protect British merchant ships on the high seas against interference by ships of either party during the conflict in Spain—interference, that is, outside the three-mile limit.

"It is not the intention of His Majesty's government that British shipping should carry war material from any foreign port to any port in Spain. In order to make this as effective as possible in the circumstances the government intends to introduce legislation rendering the carrying of arms into Spain illegal. I take this opportunity of warning all British shipping accordingly."

He said he was "not satisfied" with conditions surrounding the international non-intervention agreement, but asserted he had been informed within the last 24 hours that France was anxious that the non-intervention committee continue to exist.

(French sources indicate France had opposed recognition of either party to the Spanish civil war as a belligerent on the ground that such action would be a concession to the insurgents and Germany and Italy, in Paris it was stated that conversations between Britain and France had resulted in an agreement on identical policy, one of strict non-intervention.)

Prime Minister Baldwin during the day received a delegation headed by Winston Churchill to discuss the government's defence plans privately. The group, made up largely of Conservative members of both Houses of Parliament, was understood to have questioned the prime minister about arrangements for food storage in case of emergency and about the alleged backwardness of the rearmament programme.
