Hon. F. C. Squires Addressed
Wilmot Brotherhood
"Citizenship" was the subject of a stirring address by Hon. F. C. Squires, Leader of His Majesty's Opposition of New Brunswick, delivered at the Wilmot Brotherhood yesterday afternoon.

"Communities and towns arose," said Mr. Squires, "out of man's desire in a primitive age to protect himself against wild animals and wilder men." These people early found that in forming a village or town they had to give up some personal liberty which they had enjoyed as nomads.

"The basis of modern citizenship is the principle of giving up," Mr. Squires said. "Nations which enjoy the greatest liberty today are those whose people have given up the most as individuals."

Touching on some particular qualities of citizenship, Mr. Squires mentioned several people in world history who have been considered great men. After the test of time it is not the money mogul, the banker, the man wielding the sword of materialism that is reckoned great. It is the unselfish citizen of the world who has dedicated himself to some spiritual ideal. King George V, Abraham Lincoln, Lord Nelson and Oliver Cromwell were great men, Mr. Squires declared, because they dedicated themselves to unselfish causes.

Canada has in her natural resources and her people the potentialities of a great country. If each Canadian will do his duty as a citizen of the realm her greatness is assured, Mr. Squires concluded.

A vote of thanks was moved by E. S. Atkinson and seconded by Rev. D. R. Chouen and unanimously carried. A quartette composed of F. W. Barker, Vernon Box, W. Raymond Crewdson and F. T. Pridham sang "The Church in the Wilderness." Rev. J. S. Gregg lead the gathering in prayer.

Students' Service in Wilmot Church
Last evening's service at Wilmot church was conducted by students of the Provincial Normal school and the University of New Brunswick. The service was directed by Bob Dann, president of the Students Christian Movement at the University. Miss Norma Linton, a student of the Normal school, led the congregation in prayer. A soprano solo, "The Holy City" was given by Miss Josephine Washington of the University of New Brunswick. The scripture passage in the fourteenth chapter of St. Luke, sixteenth to thirty-first verse, was read by Miss Thelma Jewett, a student of the University. Miss Lorne Bailey played a violin solo of Herbert John's Face to Face. An anthem by Elvey, O Give Thanks, was sung by the choir.

Mr. Dann on behalf of the S.C.M. thanked Rev. J. W. Bartlett for his invitation to the students to conduct the service. He also took the opportunity to express his appreciation of the co-operation and guidance given the S.C.M. by the churches and ministers of Fredericton. Mr. Dann then called upon Rev. John Copp, Maritime Secretary of the Students Christian Federation, who addressed the congregation.

"While we usually consider the cost of anything as a matter of dollars and cents, other things may be involved in counting the cost," Mr. Copp said. "Consider the cost of identifying yourself with this man Jesus Christ," he said.

Quoting from an article he had read Mr. Copp said that Christ was born in an obscure town, the child of a peasant woman. He never wrote a book, had no credentials but Himself. While still young He was deserted by His friends, tried and crucified between two thieves. "Why should I identify myself with Him?" Mr. Copp asked.

Nineteen hundred years have brought about a great transformation. H. G. Wells who wrote a history of the World, has said that Jesus of Nazareth is easily the most dominant figure in history.

Mr. Copp quoted another author who says that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies ever built, all the parliaments that ever sat and all the kings that ever reigned together have not influenced the world as much as He has.

Why has Jesus survived the vicissitudes of the world during the last nineteen hundred years? He holds His place because He embodies all the best ideals, Mr. Copp declared. And practically, He stands because He leads true progress, welds the world into one true commonwealth.

The chief substance in the foundation and superstructure of Christianity is love. When the love of God enters a man's heart, it drives out destructive elements and brings peace and the strength to meet temptation. The price is the complete willingness to surrender all of ourselves to God. The eternal, peerless Christ challenges us by the merits of what He Himself is, Mr. Copp concluded. "He offers joy of fellowship with Him, guidance, peace and victory in the art of noble living."

Corporations Tax Act Will Provide More Prov. Funds

The majority of whose stock issued and outstanding is owned or held, either directly or indirectly, by companies, corporations, or persons incorporated or resident without the province, having an established place or places of business within the province, and every partnership, firm, association or person carrying on an established business within the province as a branch or part of or in connection with an established business carried on without the province and engaging in the sale of goods, chattels, wares or merchandise within the province direct to the consumer shall pay a tax on the amount of its or his gross sales.

"(2) Every company or corporation, the majority of whose stock issued and outstanding is owned or held, either directly or indirectly, by companies, corporations, or persons incorporated or resident without the province, having an established place or places of business within the province where it carries on or conducts the business of amusement or entertainment, and every partnership, firm, association or person carrying on an established business within the province as a branch of or in connection with an established business carried on without the province and engaging in the business of amusement or entertainment shall pay a tax on the amount of its or his gross receipts.

he looked after elsewhere and not having facilities at Fredericton it cannot be done there."

The text of the telegram received from W. U. Appleton today is as follows:

"R. L. Phillips, Fredericton, N. B.

Your wire 18th instant. Regret staff adjustments South Devon necessary to meet reduction in service due to bridge being destroyed. Equipment serving 157.86 miles between Saint John and Centreville previously maintained at South Devon must now be looked after elsewhere and not having facilities at Fredericton it cannot be done there, although two of a staff have since been employed there to take care of running work. Cannot see that a conference would be of any benefit as we are compelled to reduce our staff to meet requirements of the service and we cannot go beyond that.

Centreville 3.30 p.m., and, in the opposite direction, train now leaving Centreville at 8 a.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays will leave at 5 a.m., arriving Fredericton at 10 a.m.

The through motor train service between Saint John, Fredericton and Centreville on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays, leaving Saint John at 3.30 p.m., Fredericton 6.55 p.m., arriving Centreville 10.25 p.m., and leaving Centreville at 5.20 a.m., Fredericton 9 a.m., and arriving Saint John 12.15 p.m., is cancelled.

Services Withdrawn
In addition to the cancellation as above, train services will be withdrawn, among them being the service. Between Newcastle, Chatham and Loggieville, motor train leaving Newcastle 12:30 a.m., Chatham 1:05 a.m., daily except Monday, and 10:35 p.m., daily except Sunday, for Loggieville, and leaving Loggieville for Chatham and Newcastle at 11 p.m. and Loggieville for Chatham only at 7:30 p.m. daily except Sunday.

Other schedule changes are:

Moncton-Campbellton-Montreal
The Maritime Express will leave Moncton at 10 p.m. daily except Sunday, instead of 10:10 p.m. for Campbellton and Montreal, arriving Newcastle 12:18 a.m. and Campbellton 3:03 a.m. Train will arrive Moncton from Halifax at 9:40 p.m. instead of 9:50 p.m., arrival time at Levis (Quebec) and Montreal remaining the same.
