IGOT THIRTY DAYS

Shops at S. Devon to be Closed Down

C. N. R. STAFF ADJUSTMENTS AT SOUTH DEVON

W. U. Appleton, C.N.R. Regrets Such Action Necessary
Emergency Meeting
Equipment Must Now Be Looked After Elsewhere

When the transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade and the city council hold their meeting tomorrow afternoon at five o'clock to discuss the "emergency" railway problem which has arisen mostly as the result of the washing-out of the Canadian National Railways bridge across the Saint John river here, they will face another serious development which arose today.

This is the fact that the C. N. R. has definitely decided to lay off twenty-five employees of the railway at South Devon and close their shops at that place.

A wire received today from W. U. Appleton, vice-president of the C. N. R. at Moncton, stated in effect that there is to be no reconsideration of this latest move, although a strong protest had been lodged against this move at a meeting of Mayor Kitchen of this city, Mayor McEvoy of Devon and R. L. Phillips, chairman of the transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade here on Saturday. W. G. Clark, M. P. for York-Sunbury also has promised to intercede for the sake of the railway employees at South Devon.

At the meeting tomorrow this latest development will be considered, but it is unlikely that any representative of the railroad will be present.

Mr. Appleton in his telegram to Mr. Phillips today stated: "I cannot see that a conference would be of any benefit as we are compelled to reduce our staff to meet requirements of the service and we cannot go beyond that."

Mr. Appleton strongly intimated that the shops at South Devon would be closed down saying that "equipment serving 157.86 miles between Saint John and Centerville previously maintained at South Devon must now

Orphan Betty Lake Has New Home Tomorrow

Miss Jean Cooper, agent for the Children's Aid Society, left today for Moncton to bring little Betty Lake, eight-months old orphan of the late Mr. and Mrs. Philip Lake, to the home of her aunt, Mrs. Edward Cuthbertson, at Barker's Point. Mrs. Cuthbertson will be entrusted with the care of the child, and will become Betty's official guardian. The decision to allow Mrs. Cuthbertson the custody of the child was made by Attorney General McNair recently. Miss Cooper will bring the child to the Cuthbertson home at Barker's Point tomorrow. No disposal has yet been made of the two Bannister children, Frances and Marie, it is announced by J. Bacon Dickson, deputy attorney general.

Mrs. Cuthbertson will personally meet Miss Cooper at the train tomorrow evening and take the baby to her own home.

FREE FERRIES DISCUSSED IN COMMITTEE

A resolution, that the Public Accounts committee recommend that the Government establish free ferries for residents of localities where such ferries are established, was moved by E. W. Melville, M.P.P., Carleton county, and seconded by G. W. Perry, M.P.P., Carleton, in the Public Accounts committee meeting, presided over by J. A. Doucet, M.P.P., in the House this morning.

Mr. Melville, after J. A. Doucet, explained that it was the intention of the government to give free ferries to Shippegan and Miscou Islands in Gloucester county, asked why the Government should not make free ferries general in the province.

G. W. Perry pointed out that in Carleton county seven pay ferries lie between Woodstock and Andover and that there is only one bridge in forty miles in that district. He said that the farmers have to pay 40 cents or 50 cents to transport potatoes across the river and that they feel they are penalized.

John W. Niles, M.P.P., Victoria, said that he was entirely in sympathy with the resolution, but that he thought as a matter of policy it might be out of order before the committee.

F. T. B. Young, M.P.P., Gloucester, said that he didn't think it was a resolution the committee could undertake.

CHANGES IN TIMETABLE OF THE C.N.R.

Large Number Schedule Changes Through Province

Effective April 26

F'ton-Centreville to Be a Tri-Weekly Service

The Canadian National Railways today announced changes in its timetable, the changes to go into effect on Sunday, April 26. The changes will effect all routes in the province, and in addition a number of services have been withdrawn.

The Fredericton-Centreville route and Newcastle-South Devon route are affected in the general timetable changes.

On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays a train will leave Saint John at 9 a.m., arriving at Fredericton 2 p.m., and in the opposite direction, a train will leave Fredericton at 9 a.m. on the same days, arriving Saint John at 2 p.m. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays a train will leave Saint John 9 p.m. for Fredericton, arriving in Fredericton at 2:40 p.m. and, in the opposite direction a train will leave Fredericton on the same days at 11:20 a.m., arriving Saint John at 3:20 p.m. Train leaving Saint John for Fredericton at 8 a.m., Wednesdays and Saturdays and leaving Fredericton for Saint John at 9 a.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays is cancelled.

Between Fredericton and Centreville, a train will leave Fredericton at 10 a.m., Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, instead of 7:50 a.m., arriving (Continued on Page Five)

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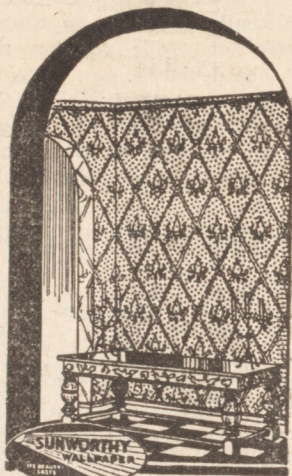
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
