Shipments of
Deer to Grand
Manan Underway

Col. H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden of New Brunswick today announced that three deer and ten muskrats have been shipped to Grand Manan Island for stocking purposes. The experiment was commenced in 1911 and deer there were protected until 1921. Now the hunters are allowed to shoot one deer. In 1930 the Department of Lands and Mines sent six deer and in 1934 they sent four deer, and three in 1935. These deer have been selected from qualified exhibits at Saint John and Fredericton. The only fur-bearing animal on the Island now is the racoon, which has proved a nuisance. The partridge is also on the Island. The muskrat shipment is an experiment this year on the Island.
