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Garson Wrecking Co. Use Steam Crane For Work This Week

Complete Next Week

Remnants of Old Bridge May Be Turned Into Ammunition

J. M. Garson of the Garson Wrecking Company, which had the contract for the removal of the sunken superstructure of the old Canadian National Railway bridge, washed away in the spring freshet of last spring, is here this week with a number of employees for the purpose of removing the last of the scrap iron on the Devon shore.

Six men of the company have been engaged for the past several days at Devon loading the scrap iron off the old C.N.R. bridge for Saint John and thence for export to foreign countries. Eventually it will be used for making of ammunition, in all probability.

A steam crane is now being used for the loading of the iron into box cars for rail shipment to Saint John. The work is expected to be completed by the end of next week. The Garson Wrecking Company completed the removal of the old bridge from its sunken position in the riverbed earlier this fall.

Civil Case Before King's Bench Division Completed Today

Three defence witnesses were heard this morning in the case of Arthur Billings, Queensbury, vs. Wilnot Mooers and Arthur McGuire, Southampton, the first case of a civil docket of four cases before the court of the King's Bench division for York county, with Chief Justice J. H. Barry presiding. The plaintiff's case was completed yesterday and this morning the defense had Arthur McGuire, Gordon Trail and Wilnot Mooers on the stand. P. J. Hughes, K.C., is conducting the case for the plaintiff, and J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., and C. L. Dougherty are appearing for the defense. The case is expected to be completed this afternoon.

Damages of \$5,000 are sought by Billings, who said yesterday while on the stand that he lost an eye when his car collided with a horse-drawn reaper driven by McGuire, who was in the employ of Mooers on September 17, 1935. Witnesses heard for the plaintiff yesterday were Billings and Clarence Cronkite.

Effective January 1, 1937, contributory pensions for Canadian Pacific employees will replace the 33-year-old non-contributory system. Since the latter system's inception in 1903, the railway has paid out \$18,201,640 in pensions. Under the new plan, officers and employees will contribute three per cent. of their wages or salaries. Pension rates will be unchanged and pensioning age will be the same as heretofore.

Two-Day Programme to Feature Number of Addresses

The York and Sunbury Teachers' Institute will meet at its annual session at the Fredericton High School building on October 29 and 30, Thursday and Friday of next week. Mrs. Louise A. Bailey, B.A., is president and John E. Page, M.A., the secretary.

The programme to be carried out during the two-day institute meeting is an interesting and educational one. During the two days the children of the city graded schools and the High School will be on holiday.

Among those who will speak at the institute meetings will be the president, Mrs. Bailey, Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Dr. A. S. McFarlane, Chief Superintendent of Education, who is away at the present time in Regina, but who will return over the week-end to this city; Prof. A. F. Baird of the University of New Brunswick; R. W. Maxwell; Major I. B. Rouse, M.A.; O. V. B. Miller, M.A., principal of the Fredericton High School; W. K. Tibert, director of Vocational Education in the province; Rev. John A. Linton, pastor of George Street Baptist Church, and others.

A feature of Thursday's programme will be the innovation of a reception to be held at the High School building at eight o'clock in the evening. This will consist of a social period and a short session on Visual Education.

During the two days' session community singing will be led by Prof. F. W. Harrison. The Institute will each day divide into primary, intermediate and High School sections. There will be the usual reports of the committees. 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FISCAL YEAR OF PROVINCE ENDS OCTOBER 31

Government Employees Busily Engaged on Accounts Now

Ministers Here Today

Provincial Accounts Are Expected to Show Surpluses

The close of the fiscal year for the provincial government comes on October 31, and in this connection Premier Dysart and his cabinet ministers as well as employees of the various departments are busily engaged at the present time preparing for that event.

Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary treasurer, has been at his office here most of the week, busy at his desk.

It is anticipated that the provincial accounts this year will show surpluses, various things being conducive to this. The government budgeted for a deficit this year. This year the Succession Duties are larger than usual, and the revenue from Motor Vehicles is expected to be higher, although there was a reduction in licenses this year. The loss from forest fires in the province during the past summer is believed to be the lowest in a number of years.

Premier Dysart is expected here either the last part of the present week or early next week. Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture, is in the city today, busy at routine tasks.

A WAIT GOV'T OPINION ON THE YORK ABATTOIR

Cabinet is Expected to Consider Matter of Assistance

Federal Aid Solicited

Hope For Early Word in Order to Get Project Started

When the provincial government meets here next week one of the matters which will, in all probability be discussed, is the matter of the proposed establishment of an abattoir and cold storage plant in York county.

Last week members of the general committee under the chairmanship of Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., Attorney-General, met with Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick and outlined the plan to the Minister, as well as solicited assistance in the establishment of this abattoir. It is understood that Hon. Mr. Taylor at the time looked on the matter with considerable favor, and promised to take the matter up with the government. The City of Fredericton, which is the original sponsor of the move to have such abattoir expect a favorable answer from both the provincial government and the federal government, both of whom are expected to assist financially in its establishment.

If the provincial government grants assistance then members of the general committee will proceed to Ottawa to secure federal aid for the project. The Daily Mail has encouraged the idea of such abattoir since its beginning.

F. J. Ellis, and C. R. Boun, both of Montreal, are visitors to the city today and are staying at the Queen.

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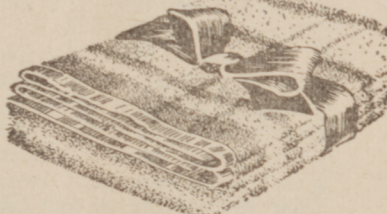
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
