N. Y. BROKER RECIPIENT OF STRANGE GIFT

C. A. Campbell Gets a Mounted Head of Unknown Animal Caught on Tobique

Believed Progeny of the Famous "Dungarvon Whooper"

Charles A. Campbell, Jr., a New York stock broker, who is spending three weeks in the province on a combined fishing and hunting trip, has returned from a brief visit to the Ogilvy sporting camps at Guisac on the Tobique. He found the foliage rather heavy in the woods and failed to bring down a deer, but his trip was not without results. Before setting out on the return trip to this city he was honored by David Ogilvy, one of New Brunswick's most efficient and versatile guides, with a gift which he prizes highly. It was nothing more nor less than the mounted head of a strange animal, which Mr. Ogilvy claims to have caught in one of his bear traps last spring. The body of the creature was badly decomposed when Mr. Ogilvy found it, and he was only able by the exercise of the taxidermist's art to preserve the head. The animal was about the size of a goat and its body was covered with soft mouse colored fur, not unlike that of a Chinchilla rabbit. There are two horns, resembling those of a domestic animal, but much smaller, which protrude from the top of the head, slope backwards and almost meet at the tips. The animal has a rather timid appearance, but the position of its horns indicates that it could take care of itself in a scrap. Mr. Ogilvy, while unable to find a name for his strange find, is quite positive that it is a lineal descendant of the famous Dungarvon Whooper, which caused so much havoc among the lumberjacks of the lower Miramichi a half century ago. He says the animal's front feet were equipped with claws, while on its hind feet had split hoofs, about as large as those of a sheep. It was Mr. Ogilvy's original intention to present the trophy to some museum or natural history organization, but when he noticed that Mr. Campbell was travelling in a station wagon labelled "Dungarvon Whooper II," he decided that it was fitting and proper that it should be handed over to him. Mr. Campbell, while he accepted the gift with some mental reservations, has promised to first place it on exhibition in Wall Street, New York, and then have Lowell Thomas, president of the Tall Story Club, give it the once over in the interest of science. Board of Examiners Announce Those Successful

Exams Written Sept. 9

No Further Examination Until July, 1937, is Statement

European Situation Fought With Danger—Brig-Gen. Hill

Brig-Gen. F. W. Hill, D.S.O., who delivered a comprehensive address before the A and B Club last evening gave some distinct impressions of European problems today, in the course of a talk on his Vimy Pilgrimage trip, and described the European scene as "fought with great danger."

Fascism and Communism are rival camps in Central Europe. The attitude of the British people towards these two political schools of thought and action is one of sanity. "The British people," said Brig-Gen. Hill, "are too sane to look seriously on either of these systems." There is very little Fascism in Great Britain today, he ventured.

The outside world regards the contest in Europe as between Communism and Fascism. European opinion said Brig-Gen. Hill, is anti-Communist but sentiment is not with either of the Fascist dictators.

Fascism in Europe today has become aggressive. The Communist state of Russia is more allied with socialists, in a defensive role—a negative role opposed to Fascism. In Spain today the struggle is between Rightist and Leftist. It is a Socialist government with a marked Communist tinge.

Brig-Gen. Hill expressed the opinion that if the Loyalist government wins in Spain's civil war that there is a danger that Communist will spread into France.

"What struck me about Germany was Hitler's attempt to induce the world to believe it is the saviour of Europe and the protector of Europe against the inroads of Communism," General Hill told the A and B Club members.

The belief is that Germany's aggressive attitude is directed towards the east and not the west. "I regard this as camouflage," said Brig-Gen Hill. "Germany's efforts toward the east is a disguise I can't see where she intends to regain her lost prestige except in the field where she lost it."

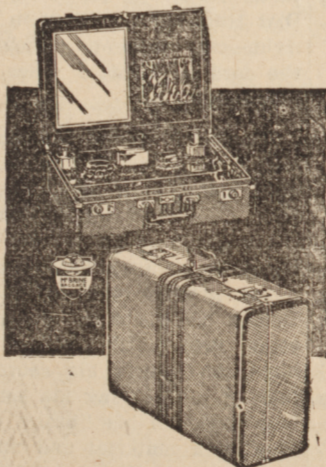
