He Stooges to Conquer

Once a stooge for Phil Baker in Vaudeville and later a stooge for Jack Benny on the air, Sid Silvers will join the ranks of his erstwhile employers as one of the air's featured comedians when he debuts with star Al Jolson and singer Martha Raye on the new Columbia programme which replaces the Ken Murray show, Tuesday, Dec. 22 at 8.30 p. m.

For eight years, Silvers was the atom of anonymity, a comedian's foil. Seated in a box, he would heckle Phil Baker on the stage. Typical of all the down-trodden, he had a Chaplinesque appeal which should have earned him fame but didn't because he never got any billing.

Two years ago, he decided that the life of a stooge was not a happy one. He had never been given the opportunity to prove, even to himself, that he could really do anything on his own. So he decided to break off with Baker, who has since replaced him with two stooges, Bottle and Beetle—which may or may not be an indication of how good a stooge Silvers was.

In the process of summing up the courage to go to Hollywood, the goal of anybody seeking quick fame, Sid listened to the blandishments of Buddy De Sylva and wrote gags for and starred in the musical comedy, "Take a Chance." This brought him to the attention of the Hollywood myrmidons who were quick to recognize his possibilities and even paid him a fare westward.

On the movie lots Silvers soon found that he was an important figure. A large glass topped desk—the first he ever even sat at—three secretaries and a private telephone were assigned to him.

He was a writer. In view of the fact that he has never gone to school this was quite an accomplishment. Even today he insists he needs a collaborator to write down his gags because he has never become too familiar with the nuances of pencil pushing.

Sid avoided school in a typical stogian manner. When he presented himself to the principal for entrance, that gentleman wouldn't believe that he was the required six years of age—he was so small. So Sid let it go at that.

His success as a movie writer was recently embellished with a starring role in the new MGM picture "Born to Dance," in which he sings, dances and tells some of the gags which he has written for this cinema piece.

He will be thirty-two years old on January 1. He was born in Brooklyn and has four brothers and sisters. Only five feet three, he shops for his clothes in the boys' department. He is married and has a daughter. He never uses makeup.

When the new Al Jolson makes its debut, Silvers will have to get used to the idea of not playing the foil for somebody. His success in the past two years has probably prepared him for this. But his appearance as a star in his own right on the air will probably go down in radio chronicles as the chapter about the worm that turned and the stooge that came into his own.

Chosen by the popular vote of the men who guide the destinies of the nation's leading teams and who have, by the nature of their work, been keen and observing students of the talents of every football player throughout the country, Kate Smith's All-Collegiate Football Teams will be unique among those groups chosen by various means at the end of every football season.

Members of the first team will receive strap watches, bearing the initials K.S.A.C., Kate Smith's All-Collegiate. The announcement will replace the customary appearance of comedy guest stars. In addition, there will be the usual "Command Appearance" of heroes, and songs by Kate, accompanied by Jack Miller's orchestra.

As Howard donned his hat and coat, after the broadcast, the two children raced up to him and asked for his autograph. The actor obligingly signed his name for them and then he asked:

"Now, how about your autographs for me? After all, you're both screen and radio stars, too."

Deanna and Bobby, both unspooled by their youthful success, were so flabbergasted it required several moments before they could recover enough to sign their names for the smiling Howard.

Halifax Disaster Dramatized on Air Friday

Creating havoc greater than that of the Chicago fire and the San Francisco earthquake combined, disaster descended upon the east coast port of Halifax in 1917 and shattered an area of two and a half square miles, left homeless 25,000 people and blinded nearly six hundred. The story of this dreadful catastrophe will be told by Jack Kannawin on his CBC Eastern and Midwest network feature, "This Week in History," to be presented from the Toronto studios on Friday, Dec. 11, at 7.30 p. m.

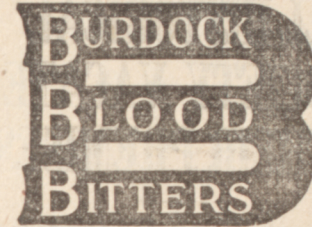
The Halifax disaster occurred on Dec. 6, 1917. The munitions ship Mount Blanc was steaming into the harbour from New York, laden with 2,800 tons of explosives. She was rammed by the Imo, a Belgian relief ship starting on an errand of mercy to that stricken country. The crew of the Mount Blanc were safely removed but half an hour later at 8.00 a.m., the ship exploded.

A tidal wave swept over the city and sea, almost every window in the city was broken, nearly thirteen hundred people on their way to work or already engaged in their daily tasks were instantly killed and the tragedy of blindness from broken glass has shocked a world, already believed past shocking. The courage and fortitude of the people were recognized by outside aid of magnificent generosity and Halifax rose from her grief to carry on.
