Candied Grapefruit Peanut Butter
Stuffed Dates
Chicken Loaf
6 tablespoons butter or fat
½ cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
2 cups milk
1 cup chicken bouillon or chicken stock

½ cup dry bread crumbs
2 cups cooked chicken, diced
3 tablespoons pimientos, minced
¼ cup celery, minced.
3 eggs, well beaten
Whole cooked mushrooms and parsley.

Melt butter in saucepan, add flour, salt and pepper, and blend thoroughly. Add the milk and chicken bouillon or stock gradually and cook slowly, stirring constantly, until it forms a thick, creamy sauce. Add the other ingredients and pour into a deep, buttered baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 35 minutes. Let stand 2 or 3 minutes, then loosen the sides with a spatula and turn out onto a hot platter. Garnish with whole cooked mushrooms and parsley. This makes 6 portions.

Chicken Mushroom Sauce
2 tablespoons butter or fat
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 can cream mushroom soup
1½ cups chicken, diced
4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
Salt and pepper
Melt butter in saucepan and blend in flour. Add the mushroom soup gradually and stir until thickened. Then add chicken and sliced hard-cooked eggs. Add salt and pepper if desired, but since the chicken and soup have been seasoned when cooked little additional seasoning will be required. Serve with chicken loaf.

Asparagus au Gratin
1 can green asparagus
Salt and pepper
4 tablespoons butter or fat
1½ cup buttered crumbs
3 tablespoons grated cheese
Place drained asparagus on a buttered heatproof platter or in shallow baking dish. Season with salt and pepper and dot with butter. Cover with buttered crumbs and sprinkle with grated cheese. Place under the broiler until well browned. This will make six portions.

Ginger Fruit Salad
3 oranges
1 banana
1 cup canned or fresh pineapple strips
¼ cup grapes, seeded
¼ cup nuts, chopped
¼ cup candied ginger, chopped
Lime French dressing.
6 orange cases
1 red apple
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Watercress

Remove orange sections from membrane, slice bananas and pine apple in slender, lengthwise strips. Cut the grapes in half. Mix together with nuts and ginger. Wash apple well, cut in strips without peeling and sprinkle with lemon juice at once to prevent discoloration. Arrange apple on top of salad so the red gives a decorative color. The salad as a whole, when placed on a bed of watercress, resembles a chrysanthemum. This will make six salads.

To make the orange cases, cut the orange peel in ¼-inch strips, 2-3 of the way from top to bottom of the orange. Remove entire peel from the orange very carefully to prevent breaking off the strips, which should appear as petals of a flower.

Lime French Dressing
¾ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon confectioners' sugar
½ teaspoon paprika
¼ cup lime juice
½ cup salad oil.
Mix dry ingredients with lime juice in a deep bowl or bottle. Add oil, beating or shaking vigorously until the consistency of cream. Use immediately, as emulsion breaks quickly. This makes ¾ cup dressing.

Fig Cake
¾ cup shortening
1½ cups granulated sugar
4 egg whites
1 teaspoon lemon extract
3 cups cake flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon molasses
1½ cups figs, finely chopped
Cream shortening, add sugar slowly, blending well. Add one unbeaten egg, white, beat well; add flavoring. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt, and add alternately with the milk. Fold in the remaining egg whites, beaten stiff but not too dry. To 2-3 of the mixture add the spices and figs. Put into well greased tube pan by spoonfuls, alternating the two mixtures. Make in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about one hour. This cake needs no icing, but if one is desired use any butter cream icing recipe.

Deviled Crabmeat
1½ cups top milk or cream
4 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1½ teaspoons dry mustard
3 cups crabmeat
Salt and pepper
½ teaspoon lemon juice
1 cup bread crumbs
1 tablespoon parsley, chopped
Heat the milk or cream in a small saucepan. Melt 2 tablespoons of the butter in a top of a double boiler. Blend in the combined flour and mustard, then add scalded milk or cream gradually, stirring until thickened, about five minutes. Remove from the fire and add crabmeat and seasonings. Mix well and put the mixture into 8 crab shells (or in one large baking dish). Sprinkle with the crumbs and place the remainder of the butter, cut into small pieces, on top of crumbs. Place under the broiler, or in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) until crumbs are brown. Garnish with parsley and the claws. Makes 8 portions.

Boy Scout News

On Thursday evening Provincial Field Worker Robert Pugh, District Scout Commissioner G. Alvah Good and Cub Commissioner Harold Doherty attended a meeting of the 1st Fredericton Junction Troop when 21 boys, many of whom had been members of the Wolf Cub Pack under Cubmaster George Ball, held a very interesting scout meeting under Scoutmaster Harry McCracken and Assistant Scoutmaster George Blair.

For the benefit of those interested in the development of the Scout Movement in this district the following facts are collected by the Scout Historian. If anyone knows of any further details in this connection it would be greatly appreciated if he would write the facts to the Scout Historian, c/o The Daily Mail, or let either of the above Scout Officers know. Scouting locally arose from small and uncertain toddling steps and it is the hope that, at as early a date as possible, we may collect the various stories of these steps.

The first troop, 1st Fredericton (Cathedral), was organized in 1912 and was the only one till 1921 for us to have a definite date on, though, at some uncertain time about 1917 or 1918, the Brunswick Street Baptist Church experimented with a troop which had no official status.

In 1921 interest was revived and the 2nd Fredericton (Cathedral) Troop was organized in February or March. This was shortly followed by the formation of the 3rd Fredericton (St. Anne's) in May of the same year.

The 4th Fredericton (Baptist) was organized in 1922 or 1923 and had a short existence, another Boys' Work programme taking its place.

The 5th Fredericton (St. Dunstan's) was organized in the fall of 1924.

The 6th Fredericton (St. Andrews), organized in 1929 disbanded in a couple of years and is now in course of organization.

The 6th Fredericton was organized in 1925 or 1926 at Victoria Mills with Rev. A. F. Bate as S/M, also lasting about two years.

The 7th Fredericton (St. Paul's) was organized in 1930 or 1931 and also had a short existence.

The 8th Fredericton (Gyro) Troop, organized in 1928, had a vigorous existence till disbanded in March or April, 1935.

Information will be welcome in regard to dates and S/Ms of the 1st Douglas Troop WilliamsburgNapodagan Troop and any other scout groups organized or attempted to be organized throughout the central part of the province.

SOUTH AFRICA PLANS BIG FLEET OF PLANES

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, May 2—Oswald Pirow, Minister for Defense in the Union of South Africa Government, disclosed to Parliament yesterday far-reaching plans to build up the defense forces of the Dominion.

He said the measures would within five years give South Africa 1,000 pilots and an anti-tank battalion with the most modern anti-tank weapons, capable of being transported 500 miles in forty-eight hours.

Pirow said it was proposed to form from the civil aircraft twelve squadrons of high-speed multi-engined bombing planes.

May Need More

At the same time he warned that he was uncertain whether these measures would prove adequate and added that South Africa might find within a year or two that she required three times the present number of first-line aircraft. In emphasizing the need for this expansion programme Pirow drew the attention of the members to the lessons of the Italian campaign in Ethiopia.

The Minister for Defense declared that ultimately a common native and common defense policy for the Union and the whole of British Africa south of the Sudan seemed inevitable, but he believed there was no necessity to force the pace in this connection.

"Our attitude toward our northern neighbors is as cordial as that of Great Britain to us, and any help we can give in connection with building up their air force or with any other means of defense will be theirs on the same generous basis as Britain applied to us."

Elementary Precautions

Pirow emphasized that South Africa was not preparing for war in the near future, but merely taking elementary precautions "which every nation must bear in mind if it values freedom and independence."

He also disclosed to Parliament that his technical department was exploring the possibility of manufacturing in South Africa various military necessities hitherto imported, including airplane engines, steel, helmets, gas masks rifle barrels aircraft bombs, artillery ammunition, grenades and armored cars.

A survey also is being made, Pirow announced, of industrial possibilities for war purposes, which he said would ensure supply of the necessary stores without dislocating civil requirements and without profiteering.
