eriment, there will be no racket," affirmed Mr. McNair. "There has been some talk in this House about honorable members having been offered money to oppose the new road. It will come with a shock to honorable members of this House to learn that members of this government have been approached with bribes to induce them to put over a certain deal in respect of a new park."

The opposition amendment, which the attorney general termed a "straight want of confidence motion against this government," would, if adopted, have placed the House on record as considering it expedient to go into supply only after the government had given assurance that it had decided not to proceed with the construction of a road from Plaster Rock to Quarryville.

This projected road Mr. McNair defended strongly in his remarks. He considered, he said, that it "should merit substantial federal assistance." He limited his remarks to the amendment.

APPROVE HYDRO EXTENSION

Officials of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission met with the government in the executive council chamber this morning. The operating report of the first four months of the fiscal year was received. It showed a marked improvement over the corresponding period last year. Petitions for extension of electric service in various parts of the province were received. Provision was made for surveys and reports as soon as the roads are opened. The commission formally approved the hydro line to Rusiagornis via New Maryland. Accounts for March were passed and other routine. Those present were as follows: Hon. W. S. Anderson, chairman; D. W. Mersereau, Fredericton Junction, vice-chairman; Pius Milchaud, Edmundston, commissioner; S. R. Weston, chief engineer and Miss L. L. Glennie, Saint John, secretary.
