Farmers With Good Credit Record Receive Consideration

Fertilizer Loans

Farmers to Pay Back When Crop is Marketed

With reference to a request made recently that the Provincial Government guarantee fertilizer loans this year, Premier Dymally announced this morning that he had been in communication with the head offices of various banks, and had received assurance that applications for loans made by farmers would receive favourable consideration by the managers, where they felt reasonably assured that the loans would be repaid when the crop is marketed.

In view of the above understanding, added the Premier, the Government does not consider it necessary to undertake a guarantee policy. "We have been assured, however", he said, "that farmers who last year met their obligations would have no difficulty in securing the necessary accommodation this year".

Y. M. C. A. Dinner Closed Financial Drive in This City

The Y. M. C. A. financial drive which has been going on for three days in this city was climaxed last evening by an enjoyable banquet held at a local restaurant. At the dinner, which was attended by the various team captains and the canvassers, it was pointed out that the objective of \$2,300 had been almost reached. RAFTING LOGS TO N. B. MILLS IS HELD UP

C. N. R. Bridge Wreckage Delays Operation of Sawing

Can't Get Logs to Mills

Other Complications Arise Because of Bridge Delay

Because of the delay in clearing away the sunken superstructure of the C.N.R. bridge, thousands of feet of bank logs now lying at Springhill are being kept away from the mills although sawing being scheduled in the near future.

Several small rafts of these bank logs were brought down from Springhill this week and were taken up to the mill on the Nashwaakiss, but generally the logs are lying in huge quantities in the vicinity of Springhill.

Much of these logs will eventually be sawn at the Port Royal Pulp and Paper Co. Ltd. mills at Saint John while some—about a quarter of a million feet will be sawn at Fraser Companies, Ltd. below this city.

Bridge in the Way

Until the C.N.R. bridge wreckage is removed from the water it will be impossible to raft these logs to the down river mills, it was stated here today. Sawing operations will thus be delayed because of the bridge obstruction in the river.

According to report from the Fraser Companies Ltd. mill today that company will saw about five million feet this season, sawing to commence around June 1. Last year seven million feet were sawn. Ninety five per cent of the cut at this mill comes from down river, however. At the present time, W. J. Glenn, manager, is engaged with crews on downriver streamdriving operations.

Boats Bothered Too

The presence of the bridge wreckage in the river has meant also that the S. S. Majestic and its sister ship the D. J. Purdy have been forced out of their usual schedule. It has been necessary ever since the ice ran out of the river for the Majestic to manoeuvre most delicately in order to dock at its usual wharf. Earlier it had been necessary to dock and unload at Victoria Mills. And now with the water of the St. John river receding still further, the bridge wreckage has become more prominent and therefore more difficult for the Eastern Canada Coastal Steamship boats to get through the narrow passageway.

FARMING IS SPURRED BY EARLY SPRING

Plowing Has Already Started at Exper. Station

Temperature Soars

Pasture Lands Ready a Fortnight Earlier

The early coming of spring and yesterday's summerlike temperature of 70 degrees in the shade indicates to agricultural officials that the present season will be a banner growing season.

Spring is opening up rapidly. Many farmers are already out on the land plowing, and at the Dominion Experimental Station here the spraying of the apple orchards will commence tomorrow.

Pastures Green

Pasturelands are becoming green and farm animals have been put out a fortnight earlier than last year. This will mean a considerable saving to the farmer on feed and labor in the stables, and will reflect creditably at the end of the season.

The mercury soared to the seventy mark yesterday and was the warmest of the season. The temperature was most unseasonable in this section of the province and citizens actually sweltered in the unusual heat.

The official temperature yesterday was 77 degrees in the shade, it being reported this morning that this was the hottest day of the season to date. The weather statistics for the month of April just closed as furnished by the Dominion Experimental Station today are as follows: Maximum temperature, 77; mean, 38.93; minimum, 22 degrees; rainfall, 2.41 inches; snow fall 9½ inches; sunshine, 124.2 hours.
