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THE CRICKET ON THE HEARTH

During the past summer and autumn, the pale-brown house cricket, scientifically known as Gryllus domesticus, has been reported causing annoyance and damage in dwellings, in a number of towns and cities, especially in southern Ontario. This insect is European in origin, and its presence in the Dominion was first recorded about fifty years ago. It is now widespread in Eastern Canada, and also in the United States, east of the Rocky Mountains. House crickets may breed prolifically in garbage dumps during the warm months of the year, and from thence find their way into neighbouring dwellings, sometimes in large numbers.

The monotonous chirruping or song of crickets is produced by the male rubbing together the outer pair of his wings, which bear special structures for this purpose. This noise is very annoying to many persons, especially as it is made chiefly at night when crickets are most active. Furthermore crickets will feed on almost any organic substance, and, as a result, sometimes do considerable damage by eating holes in clothing and other fabrics. They are very elusive insects and often difficult to locate, a fact that further exasperates distressed householders. They favour warm situations, however, and usually may be found hiding in cracks and crevices in walls and brickwork close to furnaces, fireplaces, chimneys and ovens. Where conditions are suitable, the crickets may continue active all winter.

The most effective action to take against this species of cricket is preventive in character, and consists of eliminating dumps by incinerating all garbage. This action also serves to control house flies and blow flies which breed in immense numbers in such material, and are a menace to health. If such action is not considered practicable, and crickets have become established in a dump, poisoned baits may be used under proper supervision by municipal authorities. Formulae for the baits may be secured from the Dominion Entomologist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. For the destruction of those crickets that have become established in dwellings, the use of fresh pyrethrum powder, or sodium fluoride is recommended. These materials should be blown liberally into the places wherein the crickets are hiding by means of a dust gun or insecticide puffer, bearing in mind the fact that sodium fluoride is poisonous to humans and animals. Pyrethrum fly sprays are also effective when in actual contact with the insects.

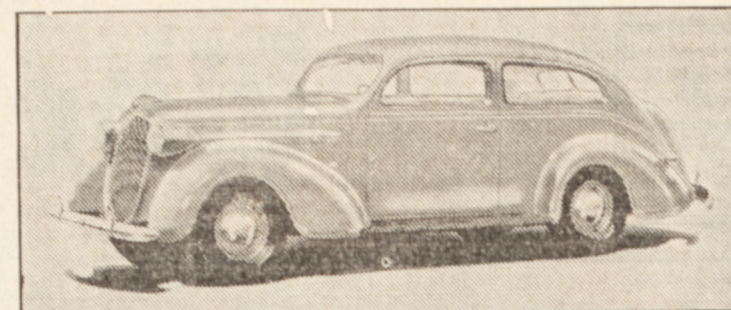
