## FREDERICTON HIGH SCHOOL N. B. INTERSCHOLASTIC CHAMPS

Beat St. Vincent's 3-0 in Title Game at Saint John  
Yesterday --- How the Score Came

SAINT JOHN, Nov. 12—Coach Egbert Cass' Fredericton High fifteen are back home today resting on their laurels. For the second straight season they are champions of New Brunswick Interscholastic rugby.

Yesterday they were forced to the limit at Allison athletic grid here as they triumphed over the battling Irish of St. Vincent's High School in the final game for the crown 3-0.

Crisp weather greeted the teams as they lined up for the "sudden death" encounter that decided the supremacy for another year.

The winning try, unconverted, which gave Fredericton High victory, came about five minutes before the end of the first half when Clark, fast three-quarter linesman, went over with the ball.

Up to that time the teams had battled on even terms, giving no quarter and taking none. It was a bitter, gruelling tussle between the old foes and only after a great fight in the second half, when they had the Capital squad with its back to the wall, did the Irish admit defeat.

Try as they did in that final session St. Vincent's could not shove a man past an impregnable defence that Fredericton High threw up back of its five-yard line.

On two occasions when the Irish were within five and three yards of the Fredericton goal line in the second half penalties were called by referee Henry Hollies for picking the ball out of the scrum. Both plays presented opportunities that would have meant a draw and possibly victory had not the St. Vincent's fifteen, to a man, been too anxious.

It was Clark and McLennan who got away in the play that brought victory.

In the first half Fredericton started a drive down the field and time and again St. Vincent's were forced to give ground. The tension was eased by beautiful kicks to centre field or into Fredericton territory.

Cass used his eight-man scrum yesterday effectively although it was not used in weight to shove a man across St. Vincent's line.

## B. Y. P. U.'S OPPOSE GAMBLING, LIQUOR

Ask That Church Give Young People a Clear Lead  
on Social and Economic Questions

FREDERICTON JUNCTION, Nov. 12—The annual Rally of the Fourth District Baptist Young People's Union was held in the United Baptist Church at Lakeville Corner on the seventh instant, afternoon and evening. Miss Helen C. Young of Oromocto, vice-president, in the chair, and Rev. T. A. Glendenning, secretary pro tem. Sixty-four B.Y.P.U. representatives were present, including eight from the local society.

Following committees were appointed: Nominating—Rev. T. A. Glendenning, John Taylor, Edna Noble, Mary Bridges and Majory Young; Resolutions—Mrs. Glendenning, Lawrence Harvey, Grace Young, Gordon H. Westrup.

Addresses were given—On Ideal Friendship, by Rev. T. A. Glendenning; and on the Results of Rebirth, by Miss Marjory Young, Lawrence Harvey and Rev. H. G. Westrup. Miss Verna Nason gave a reading and Walter O'Donnell a solo. Rev Mr. Glendenning spoke in favor of the B. Y. P. U.'s meeting with the District and participating in its programme and in favor of Oratorical Contests.

It was decided to meet with the District at the latter's annual meeting next spring and take one part of the programme.

During recess, supper was served by the local society in the church hall. The evening song service was led by John Taylor. In the devotional exercises, the chairman, Mrs. Glendenning, H. H. Stuart, Mrs. Roy Simmons, who sang a solo, and others took part.

Following officers were chosen, as recommendation of Nominating Committee: President, Helen C. Young, Oromocto; vice-president, Walter O'Donnell, Rusagons; secretary-treasurer, Donald Storr, McAdam, (re-elected). The following resolutions were adopted, on recommendation Resolutions Committee.

1. Thanks to local society; 2. That this B.Y.P.U. Rally express itself in favor of suppression of lotteries and all forms of gambling whether for charity or other purposes; 3. That this Rally is strictly opposed to sale of intoxicating liquors; 4. That this Rally urge the Churches to give the young people a clear lead in regard to the social and economic questions of the day.

On motion of H. H. Stuart and Mrs. Glendenning the Oratorical Contests were endorsed and accepted and urged upon all branches.

The University of New Brunswick rugby squad defeated Fredericton City 12-0 at College Field yesterday afternoon to win their first game of the season. The contest, arranged for benefit of Ron Beatty, ex-U.N.B. star and Fredericton City fullback, who was hurt in the Mount Allison-Fredericton City tussle almost a month ago, was a ragged exhibition of football.

U.N.B. had a very decided edge on their rivals, dominating the play most of the time. Fumbles were frequent, the biting cold being responsible for many. Palmer, Stuart and Corbett scored U.N.B.'s four tries. No converts were made. During the first half City played two men short, and U.N.B. with 14 men. Outstanding for the former were Goodine, Kilburn, Coveney and Laskey, while Wilson, Palmer, Corbett, Bartlett and Jackson shone for U.N.B.
