## BARONESS DE BUECK ESTABLISHES 'FRIENDSHIP HOUSE'

It will interest friends in the city to note that a recreational institution recently opened in Ottawa by His Excellency Most Rev. J. G. Forbes, Archbishop of Ottawa, was established by the wife of a Russian Baron well known in this city.

Located at 279 Rochester street, the Friendship House was established by Baroness Catherine de Hueck, Russian refugee, as a recreational centre, for transient men. The premises, formerly used as a store, have been completely renovated and have been made very attractive. Baroness de Hueck has received the assistance of numerous in social women, many prominent in social circles, in organizing the Friendship House, which will be opened to transient men of all races and creeds.

The house was open for inspection throughout the day and all those who visited it were invited to sign their names in a souvenir book. Baroness de Hueck thanked the Archbishop and all those present for their generous encouragement and stated that her only aim is to help in preserving Christian principles and to fight Communism through the medium of Christian education.

The new institution comprises 14 rooms all of which have been furnished as a result of private donations. There is a large recreation hall where the men can rest and enjoy themselves playing cards or other games. The house offers no sleeping facilities at night but one meal will be served daily at noon to those who stop there. Public lectures will also be given and all those who wish to attend can do so.

Baron de Hueck spent the winter in Fredericton a few years ago, he having been employed here as consulting engineer at the construction of the new pier on the C.N.R. bridge.

## This Safety Pledge?

1. I will drive more CAREFULLY.
2. I will not pass a car unless I have 200 yards clear vision ahead as required by the Provincial Law.
3. I will not pass a car in traffic until I have looked and ascertained that no car is bearing down from behind.
4. I will not jump traffic lights, nor drive through red lights while the signal is changing.
5. I will always park my car in such a manner so as not to endanger the lives of others.
6. In city traffic, I will be particularly watchful of pedestrians stepping into the line of traffic from between parked cars, also when entering and leaving street cars and busses.
7. I will always give proper hand signals before turning to the left, to the right, or stopping; I will never leave the curb from a parked position until I have given the proper hand signal.
8. I will always remember while driving that I must watch out for FOUR CARS—my own, the one in front of me, the one behind me, and especially for one around the curve or up side streets, that I CANNOT SEE.

If you will sign and keep this pledge you will do your part to make our streets and highways safe for the motorist, safe for driver of vehicles, safe for pedestrians, safe for everybody.
