Mitchell F. Hepburn, Premier and Provincial Treasurer of Ontario, who argued that interest rates in excess of 5 per cent. were too high for the provinces to pay.

It was agreed that compulsory conversion on a Dominion-wide scale, involving the arbitrary slashing of interest rates without the consent of the lenders, was out of the question, and the question was shelved.

Since then considerable refunding has been done at lower rates of interest, and Premier Aberhart of Alberta has upset the financial apple cart by not only refusing to accept Federal supervision of Provincial financing as a condition of further Dominion loans to Alberta, but he has passed legislation cutting interest rates in half on the Province's \$160,000,000 of outstanding securities, without the consent of the people from

whom the money was borrowed.

Under the proposed loan council scheme—designed to control loan and debt policies—the Dominion government would have guaranteed the bonds of any province, and would have been safeguarded against loss on these guarantees by pledges of the Federal subsidies to the provinces and other specific revenues.

Premier Aberhart refused to play ball on this basis, claiming it would involve surrendering the financial sovereignty of the province. Thereupon the Dominion government declined to proceed with its plan of securing amendments to the British North America Act to legalize certain taxes which the province were, and still are imposing. In any event, New Brunswick opposed constitutional amendments.

One object of the National Finance committee will be to place Canadian government finance and budgeting on a sounder basis. It is too much to hope for a balanced Federal Budget this year, notwithstanding that income taxation will yield the high record figure of nearly \$100,000,000 and sales taxation a like amount, which also will be a record. But if internal and external trade continues to expand, there is no reason why Canada should not get out of the red in the fiscal year of 1937-38, which will not be so bad in the light of the deficits of the United States, running into billions of dollars.

W. C. T. U. Meeting

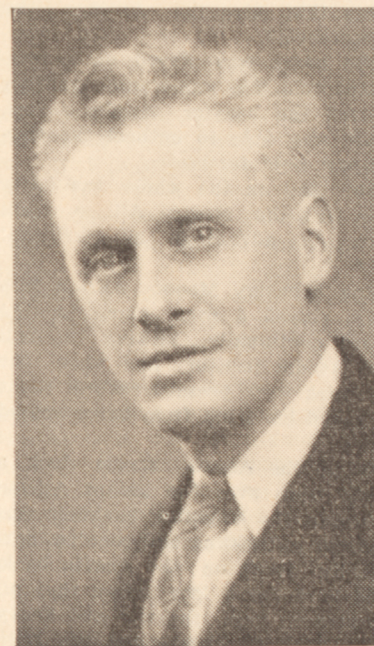
