Canada could not continue indefinitely to ignore the responsibility of protecting her trade avenues on the three oceans surrounding her vast domain, he contended. We should not hesitate any longer to do something to assure a continuance of unfetter ed trading.

Britain had shown the way, Mayor McGreer declared, and the results were substantial evidence of the wisdom of such moves. Advancement of the most costly peace-time rearmament programme ever undertaker was the first issue seen by the recent guest of the Lord Mayor of London as one of the four stimulants to recovery Various forms of assistance granted the agricultural industry and the assumption of responsibility by the National Government for the physical condition of the people, and managed currencies, were the other three
