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**SMITH FINDS RED PERIL IN U.S.
IN LEFTISTS' SUPPORT OF NEW DEAL**

Climaxing Anti-Roosevelt Speeches, He Says in
Albany That Moscow Dictates Aid for New Deal
in Hope of Conquering America Peaceably

ALBANY, Nov. 2.—Firing his last and bitterest blasts of all into President Roosevelt's administration, Alfred E. Smith told a nation-wide audience that for those who loved America there was nothing to do next Tuesday except to swing away from the New Deal and vote for Governor Alfred M. Landon for President.

The former leader of the Democratic forces of the nation accused President Roosevelt of fomenting class hatred, of courting and receiving the support of Communists, Socialists and any and all other Left Wing elements that would back his New Deal.

"I will tell you why they are supporting him," said Mr. Smith. "Because they are entirely satisfied with his Administration in that it gives promise, by the united front of the farmer and the laborer, as dictated from the Comintern in Moscow, to conquer America, and countries like

America that have constitutional law, by peaceful means rather than by bloodshed in the beginning."

Mr. Smith charged that the New Deal had deliberately retarded economic recovery in this country in order to "put over cackpot schemes," and asked all those who had found jobs, in private industry to credit it to the fact that the country had made progress in spite of, rather than because of, the activities of the Roosevelt administration.

The American system, he said, had been saved by the Supreme Court. "Did he (Roosevelt) take the court's decisions as he should?" Mr. Smith inquired. "Not at all; he criticized it."

Directly and by implication, Mr. Smith charged the President with attempting to break down the American form of government by commanding and "compelling" Congress to pass the measures he desired.

**"PERFECT FOOL"
SILK TOPPER
ON AIR AGAIN**

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Ed Wynn, the "perfect fool," and Graham McNamee, the "perfect foil," are going to be brought together again. Beginning on Saturday, November 14, the lispng comedian and his straight man and sidekick will start a new weekly series over the NBC-Blue Network at 8:00 p.m., EST, under the sponsorship of Spud Cigarettes.

Ed and Graham have been together on the air for more than three years, and they admire each other's talents. "Say, Graham's the greatest foil a comedian could have," says Wynn. "I enjoy working with Wynn more than any programme I have done in my entire career," says McNamee.

Wynn made his radio debut 14 years ago—June 12, 1922, to be exact. On that date he took the entire cast of "The Perfect Fool" over to the old WJZ studios in Newark and presented the show complete, including the ballet, which Ed described for listeners.

Graham McNamee had joined the staff on WEAF, then a rival station to WJZ, just one month before as a singer who consented to do some announcing on the side.

Wynn, with McNamee as his straight man, returned to radio on a National Broadcasting Company network ten years after his initial broadcast. On April 26, 1932, he inaugurated his first regular radio series and almost immediately became one of the most famous characters on the air.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair to be held at Toronto, November 18 to 26, is a magnet for the travelling public who come every year to see it from all parts of the Dominion. East of Quebec City, Lévis and Megantic, they will be good going from November 14 to 24 inclusive. Return in all cases to be not later than Nov. 30.

The Royal Winter Fair represents the culminating point in agricultural business and progress for the year, and invariably attracts very heavy attendances to the Queen City. This year, according to all prospects, it will be greater than ever, a result to which the above concessions will no doubt greatly contribute.

BACK ON AIR
AGAIN SOON**

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The Baron Munchausen, fabulous figure of the microphone, is coming back to the air.

Jack Pearl, creator of the Baron, will resume that long-popular role when he returns to the coast-to-coast NBC-Blue Network on Monday, November 9, after a year-and-a-half absence from the airwaves. During that time, the man who made "Vas you dere, Sharlie?" a national catchphrase, has been travelling in Europe and South America. "Sharlie" will be "dere" too, again the polysyllabic person of Cliff Hall, who has for years been at Jack's side as his straight man.

The new series, sponsored by Brown and Williamson Tobacco Corporation of Louisville, Ky., in the interest of Raleigh and Kool cigarettes, will be heard every Monday night from 9:30 to 10:00 p.m., EST.

Although he will return to the character which made him a favorite from coast to coast several years ago, Jack promises an entirely new programme idea, with situation comedy as its keynote.

Jack Pearl, like several of his outstanding contemporaries of stage and radio fame, was born on New York's lower East Side and was a seasoned trouper by the time he reached his teens. Together with several of those now famous contemporaries, he was for some time a headliner in Gus Edwards' vaudeville troupe of talented juveniles. His years of seasoning in show business encompassed far-flung experience in burlesque and vaudeville before he graduated to stardom on the Broadway musical stage. For some time he was one of the brightest stars presented by the late Florenz Ziegfeld, Broadway's master showman and it was under the Ziegfeld banner that he first came to radio, in the impresario's first and only air revue. Soon after that he created the Baronial role, and, in his own programmes became one of the foremost figures of the broadcasting studios.
