FOX PEN REGULATIONS

Today's Royal Gazette contains notice that in towns, village and thickly settled and built-up portions of the county of Carleton, no fox ranch or pens shall be established or maintained in which foxes are intended to be kept, without a written permit from the sub-district board of health, and no such permit shall be issued by such board for the keeping of such animals within 300 feet of any neighbor's inhabited house, centre of street or public highway. Fox ranches or pens shall be kept in a sanitary condition and in conformity with such regulation or bye-laws relating thereto as the sub-district Board of Health may make. Any permit will be subject to revocation at any time if terms are not complied with.

OROMCTO MAN  
BURNED WHEN  
STOVE EXPLODES

Rainsford Foss, Night Watchman, Victim Last Night

Comfortable Today

Worked With McNamara Construction Co. at Oromocto

Rainsford Foss, of Oromocto, who has been employed as night watchman at the site of the McNamara Construction Company's road construction activities at Oromocto, was painfully injured last night in an explosion which occurred in the tiny shelter which he used along the side of the road.

An oil stove which Mr. Foss used in his three-foot wide shelter, exploded and the tiny house was burned in the resulting blaze. He was picked up and taken to the Victoria Hospital last night by B. Pollard, of Ontario, a traveller, who happened along as the explosion occurred. Mr. Foss was burned about the arms and face in the explosion.

Today at the Victoria Hospital Mr. Foss' condition was reported to be fairly comfortable.

Hospital Aid  
Society's Activities  
During Past Year

Mrs. A. S. Thompson, secretary of the Hospital Aid Society, reports the Society to have had a very successful year. During the year funds to carry on were provided through dues, Hospital Aid Calendars, Amateur Night and the Hospital Aid Bridge Club. Their first responsibility is to pay \$200.00 towards the support of a bed in the free ward. Some years ago the Society furnished a private room in the hospital and they feel it is their duty to look after the upkeep of the room. The only requirement this year was a new mattress which was supplied. Material for seven dressing gowns for the wards was purchased and the gowns made up by the seamstress at the hospital. Eighteen chairs were repaired and upholstered. The usual \$10. prize given at the nurses graduation to the nurse making the highest marks in obstetrics. October 31 was Jam and Jelly Day. The members solicit and collect and as a result the hospital's own supply was augmented by 187 jars. At Christmas the members are expected to send something to the hospital. The donations consist of turkeys, ice cream, fruit and candy. Two members visit the hospital each month. The small sum of \$2.50 is allowed to provide fruit, cigarettes and toys for the free patients. The one major effort of the Society this year was the purchase of a Multi-beam Light costing \$495 This light seems to have given every satisfaction and to have been very much appreciated by the board and staff. It is also a great benefit to all surgical patients. The above report is only a portion of the regular annual report which is published in the Hospital Year Book.

AGRICULTURAL  
SHORT COURSE  
OPENED HERE

Forty - Four Students Expected as Total Enrolment

22 French-Speaking

All Counties in N. B. Are Represented at School

The annual agricultural short course which will last for six weeks opened at the Provincial Agricultural School here today. It is expected that when the enrolment is completed that 44 students will have enrolled. Of the applicants for the course, 22 are French speaking students. Fourteen of these are from Madawaska county which generally leads the province in the number of students which attend. This large delegation from Madawaska county is partly due to the fact that the council of that county assists the groups in the way of scholarships. Nearly all other counties of the province will be represented. In the case of Carleton and Victoria counties the agricultural school at Woodstock provides for the boys in that section. O. C. Hicks, superintendent of the soils and crops division, is supposed to be principal of the school. When interviewed by The Daily Mail yesterday, however, Mr. Hicks did not seem to know anything about what was going on and was not in the position to give the press any information.

On the English speaking staff are Dr. H. J. Pugsley, provincial veterinarian; L. C. Young, assistant horticulturist at the Experimental Station, and L. Giesbach, assistant superintendent at the Station. On the French speaking staff are P. Daigle, assistant to the poultry superintendent of New Brunswick; Alphonse Dionna, district agricultural representative, Edmundston; and G. D. Gaudet, assistant agricultural representative in Gloucester county.
