## STAR REPENTS \$20,000 ACT

### Miss Sullivan's Broken Arm Follows Childish Play on Sound Stage

HOLLYWOOD, California, April 14—If your children attempted to play in their own back yard in the manner that Margaret Sullivan, Stuart Erwin and Henry Fonda did one day recently on the million-dollar set of that now thoroughly jinxed Paramount production, "Hotel Imperial", you probably would give them a sound spanking and send them off to bed.

Miss Sullivan, star of the picture, who gets \$5,000 a week; Erwin, who draws in the neighborhood of \$2,200, and Fonda (Miss Sullivan's former husband) whose weekly pay runs about \$2,000, were playing childish games on a sound stage where a feverish director and his equally frantic staff were attempting to get under way a revamped film on which the company has already taken a dead loss of more than a million dollars.

This unbelievable situation had been brought about through Marlene Dietrich's walkout several weeks previously in the middle of the film and the costly necessity of rewriting the entire script, manufacturing new sets and engaging new players for the fresh start.

### Dangerous Play-Pen

You must have an eye picture of the average sound stage to understand fully just how dangerous a play-pen it can be for a gang of romping children. Electrical cables of varied length and breadth leave in and about a litter of unsound lamps and spots. There are sound cameras and gadgets too numerous and too involved for lucid description by the layman. Props of every description are piled up in any available bit of unused space. Members of the working crew tread cautiously over and around these obstacles as they go about their duties.

It was late afternoon, Fonda had come over to the set to visit with his ex-wife. For a while they sauntered quietly in a corner of the stage while a new camera setting was being made. Erwin and other members of the cast were standing or sitting about chatting.

Suddenly Fonda recalled that he had some interesting trick squirt guns in his pocket. Now for some fun. One of them was filled with fluid the color of blood. He pointed it at the back of Miss Sullivan's neck and gave the rubber spring a squeeze. Some of the children started laughing at the spectacle.

### Childish Glee

Other squirt guns were produced and soon about a dozen of the boys and girls whose aggregate weekly salaries total about \$20,000 were squealing and giggling with childish glee over the new toys.

Two paces away Henry Hathaway, the director, was mopping his brow and discussing with Charles Lang, Hollywood's highest-salaried cameraman, the proper light shadings to be gained on the set which was being prepared for the children to act upon. The boys and girls were making a lot of clatter, but Hathaway and Lang put their heads together and went on with the serious conference.

Tiring of the squirt guns, Miss Sullivan spied a seltzer bottle on a nearby table. And there right in front of her sat Erwin. As eye-witness reports go, Miss Sullivan grabbed the bottle and siphoned a sizzling stream down the back of Erwin's neck. Erwin let out a surprised and anguished howl and jumped to his feet. Miss Sullivan turned on her heel and started to scoot out of Erwin's clutches.

But she failed to reckon with the litter on the sound stage. Her heel struck the steel base of a baby spot and she fell heavily to the floor, her right arm curled beneath her body.

There was an angry crunching noise, like the ripping of heavy canvas and the bone in Miss Sullivan's right arm pierced the surface of the skin just below the elbow. Miss Sullivan fainted and was carried to the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, where the broken bone was reset. She is now resting comfortably at home but will be unable to work for at least six weeks.

### Another Star

In the meantime, Paramount has sent out an SOS to the entire industry begging the loan of one more feminine star to make the picture. It is likely that Bette Davis, the current academy award queen, will go over from Warner Brothers to attempt the rescue. And it appears quite possible that when Hathaway and his crew make their third start on "Hotel Imperial", probably a week or two hence, the children will be forbidden the use of their toys—at least during working hours.

P. S.: Marlene Dietrich, who inaugurated the epidemic of "Hotel Imperial" trouble, is reported to have 12 of her trunks packed and soon will be sailing away on her picture-making jaunt to Europe. Personally, Miss Dietrich didn't do so badly by "Hotel Imperial". Paramount paid her \$250,

## VIMY'S BATTLE CANADA'S GREAT WAR HIGHLIGHT

### Air-Marshal Bishop, V. C., Recalls War Days, at Belleville

BELLEVILLE, April 14—"Vimy was a Canadian show, a Canadian battle and an entirely Canadian victory; its difficulties made it all the more important and they, combined with its dangers, must have been the inspiration of the troops that conquered it on that wet morning", Air Marshal Bishop, V. C., said at the veterans' reunion Vimy anniversary dinner here last night. "That is why", he said, "we choose Vimy as our great anniversary."

### Great Fight Recalled

Memories of overseas were brought back as the Canadian war ace told of his and others' experiences at Vimy and in other Canadian battles. He spoke of the bravery and gallantry of the Canadians as symbolized by their victory at Vimy and by the battles of his fellow-aviators.

He referred with respect and admiration to the Germans during and after the war. He paid tribute to the late King George and to King Edward, "that man who, while still young, was one of us—Captain David Windsor, M. C.—a Staff officer of the Canadian Corps".

### Stands Alone

The story of Vimy was inscribed on the battle honors of Canadian regiments engraved on the tombs of Canadian dead, and written in the hearts of the British people for all time, Air Marshal Bishop said. In spite of other Canadian battles—at Ypres, the Somme, Passchendaele—Vimy stood alone.

He was not at Vimy himself, officially, he said, but took part in that battle and the battle at Arras, waged 000 for not making it. And after she walked out on it, she succeeded in collecting \$30,000 additional for three weeks during which she didn't go near the set.
