WOULD PROHIBIT AMERICAN ARMED FORCES LEAVING HOME

Practical Method of Insuring Peace to the United States — America's Sons Would No More Be Cannon Fodder — All Asked to Contribute to Peace Movement.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Amendment of the Constitution as a simple and practical method to "guarantee everlasting peace to our nation" is proposed by Major General Smedley D. Butler, in an article in *The Woman's Home Companion*. His suggested Amendment for Peace is as follows:

1. The removal of members of the land armed forces from within the continental limits of the United States and the Panama Canal Zone for any cause whatsoever is hereby prohibited.
2. The vessels of the United States Navy, or of the other branches of the armed service, are hereby prohibited from steaming, for any reason whatsoever except on an errand of mercy, more than 500 miles from our coast.
3. Aircraft of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps is hereby prohibited from flying, for any reason whatsoever, more than 750 miles beyond the coast of the United States.

"Such an amendment," General Butler writes, "would be an absolute guarantee to the women of America that their loved ones would never be sent overseas to be needlessly shot down in European or Asiatic or African wars that are no concern of our people. Such an amendment, linked with adequate naval and military defenses at home, would guarantee everlasting peace to our nation."

In explaining how the amendment would work, General Butler points out that the United States is in no danger whatever of military invasion, first because of its geographical position, and second because of political dissensions abroad, which prohibit any one nation from leaving its borders unguarded in order to make war 3,000 or 6,000 miles distant. Even if foreign nations ever could agree to pool their resources against the United States, he adds, there still would be little fear of successful invasion. "Therefore," he says, "with the invasion of our shores an impossible military undertaking, the only war in which we can possibly become involved is one in which our people would have no interest and no concern—and no right to join. It would be one into which we should be thrown by some economic, political or diplomatic intrigue, and not a war which we should wage in defense of our homes. And it is just such a war, a war such as the late World War, that we must protect ourselves."

As for the country's territories and dependencies, the General would let them all go, except the Canal Zone, which is necessary to defense, Ha-

VIOLATION OF TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 14.—Violation of Portuguese territory by Spanish government troops was charged early today in a broadcast by Captain Botelho Moniz, director of the Portuguese Radio Club.

He declared a group of 30 "Communists" crossed the frontier at Campos Maior, seized a Spanish lieutenant-colonel who had taken refuge on a Portuguese estate and shot him dead.

The alleged invaders, Captain Moniz asserted, pointed guns at Portuguese farm laborers.

The lieutenant-colonel was tied to a tree trunk and shot, the broadcast said, but the fate of his son, a captain, and his daughter-in-law, who also were in refuge on the estate, was not known.

Moniz urged all Portugal to rise in protest against what he called "this gross violation of her integrity."

At the regular quarterly meeting of the Fredericton Fish and Game Protective Association held last evening in the council chamber of the city hall, Harry C. Moore, chairman of the local game bird committee, brought up the matter of the open season for ducks, and moved that the open season remain as at present, opening on September 15 and extending until November 15. There had been some conflicting opinion on this matter and parties in Saint John had wanted the season to open on October 1 and extend to November 30, but residents and landowners wanted the season to remain as it is at present. The motion was seconded by Frank Shute and passed.

W. K. Hay, the president, was in the chair at last night's meeting. There was some discussion on this year's game exhibit at the Fredericton Exhibition, and it was moved by Harry C. CONTINENT-WIDE HORTICULTURAL SHOW AT CHICAGO

Lovers of Flowers, Fruit
Will Have Opportunity
to Compete

Canadian growers of owers, vegetables, and fruits will have the opportunity to compete in the first continent-wide exhibition devoted exclusively to horticulture that has ever been held.

The occasion will be the International Horticultural Exposition, which will take place September 12 to 20, 1936, in the new International Amphitheatre at Chicago. Splendid facilities will be provided for the show and it will be staged by an advisory committee of prominent horticulturists.

Its sponsors proposed to give the same recognition to horticulture that for many years has been given to agriculture in the annual International Live Stock Exposition at Chicago.

Dr. G. I. Christie, president of the Ontario Agricultural College, expresses the belief that the Exposition will have a strong appeal to many people throughout Canada.

"The opportunity to see and take part in a display of such magnitude, featuring the best production of the garden, will not only be a pleasure but a real education and help," says Dr. Christie. "It will be another great educational institution where interested persons may enjoy the displays and visit and exchange views."

The chairman of the Exposition's advisory committee, Dr. J. C. Blair, head of the horticultural department of the University of Illinois, states that since the Exposition will be held just before frost, when gardens are in full bloom, it should have the widest possible popular appeal. There will be a place in the Exposition for exhibits from everyone interested in any phase of horticulture, amateur, professional, and commercial growers, nurserymen, florists, garden clubs, associations, institutions, and educational agencies.

Premium lists containing full details of the competitive classes will soon be ready for distribution to those addressing requests to the Exposition headquarters at the Chicago Stock Yards.

The management announces that word has been already received from 30 state colleges, the Ontario Agricultural College, and the United States Department of Agriculture, that they will give active co-operation to the Exposition; and 33 state and national horticultural societies have indicated that their members will participate as exhibitors.

BATHTUBS AND REFRIGERATORS ATTEMPTED AS BAGGAGE

OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—Bathtubs, refrigerators, furnace blowers, and the like, brought unhappily to border Customs inspectors during early operation of the \$100 tourist customs exemption law, it was disclosed today, but such things are now of the past.

Enterprising Canadians, seeking to take full advantage of the new law, drove to customs points from the United States with bathtubs roped to baggage carriers of their cars, refrigerators, furnace blowers and other bulky pieces of machinery or furniture stuffed into the back seats, only to find such articles were not baggage in the legal definition of the word.

Baggage, says the law, is something railways will accept as such, and no parlor car porter will hoist a bathtub into the luggage rack. Portable radio sets, portable typewriters, fishing tackle, clothing and like articles may be carried across the border by tourists returning after an absence of forty-eight hours or more from Canada.
