mark is known to every candidate from the Fredericton High School."

"Another grammar school teacher stated that the majority of his pupils were total failures when they bumped up against this paper, although under ordinary conditions some of them made excellent marks in other geometry tests. It is known that one school inspector and one grammar school teacher sat down together and tried to work out one question only of this paper and were unable to get the results after two hours' work. The teacher, finally went home and tackled the paper again and after another hour's work he got the answer. And yet some of my pupils were supposed to do a whole paper in two hours, which these two men took three hours to do, in which was included a question which two men took three hours to do. One Fredericton boy who says that he could make a hundred on the paper is subnormal. We are dealing with ordinary people."

Continuing, he said: "No business man would for one moment handle affairs in as unreasonable a manner as the above example shows the educational authorities are handling theirs. As another editorial in your paper stated, if ever a people clung to the old tenaciously simply because they did not wish to relinquish their jobs and departments as educators, it is the so-called educators at the head of our provincial school affairs. When these people who are paid by the public get anything into their heads, a stick of dynamite wouldn't jar it out."

"There is absolutely no reason whatever why there should not be a disallowance of this notoriously unjust geometry paper. But will these people who for the time being control our educational affairs disallow this paper which was given by a man not familiar with high school work? I bet that the paper will be allowed to stand so far as the local educational authorities are concerned, and while I do not believe in introducing politics into the educational department I do believe that there are times when the intervention of business men and level-headed men, such as we have in our provincial government, is necessary in order to get results."

house. W. G. Quinn occupied the chair, and a large number of delegates were present from the surrounding districts. The convention was held for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest the bye-election for the House of Assembly in this county whenever such bye-election may occur. This is for the seat made vacant by the death of the late Stewart E. Durling, who passed away a few weeks ago.

During the progress of the convention a resolution of sympathy was passed expressing regret of Our Late Majesty and also expressing loyalty to our present king, Edward VIII. Another resolution expressing hearty appreciation of the public services rendered to this constituency by Hon. R. B. Hanson, K.C., who devoted many of the best years of his life to the services of this county and to the Dominion as a Minister of the Crown. The hope was also expressed that Mr. Hanson would return to public life in the not distant future. The convention also thought fit to pass a resolution condemning the government led by Hon. A. A.
