Campbellton for ordinary civic purposes a revenue of \$174,764 as against Fredericton's \$90,200, he said.

He said that Fredericton's bonded indebtedness is \$690,000 as compared with Campbellton's \$1,004,000; Fredericton's water works system \$249,177.07 as against Campbellton's gasification system \$436,997.32; Fredericton's sewerage system \$117,973.93, Campbellton's \$3,000 over and above that of Fredericton; Fredericton's City Hall \$57,000, Campbellton's small concrete Municipal Building \$44,064.87; Fredericton's concrete sidewalks \$30,781.66, Campbellton's \$67,088.48; Fredericton's lighting plant \$20,000, Campbellton's \$249,904.26.

The second bill before the committee was an Act to Amend Chapter 72 of Act 25 George V, 1935, "The Town of Dalhousie Assessment Act." Ernest Doiron and G. R. Balmer of Dalhousie, supported the bill. Mr. Doiron explained that the bill will increase exemptions on incomes of married persons from \$400 to \$1,000, and that there will be a further exemption of \$200 for each taxpayer's dependent.

He was next employed as gang foreman, inspector, district foreman and supervisor of construction, being appointed plant supervisor, June 11, 1935.

"Y" DISPLAY PROVED GREAT ATTRACTION

One Hundred Boys and Girls in Skillful Display—Credit Due to Y Committee and Ralph Albrant, Secretary—Harry Ballantyne of Toronto Spoke.

The "Y" Gym display sponsored by the local committee of the Y.M.C.A. and with one hundred local youths in gymnastic exhibition was put on in the Fraser Memorial auditorium last evening, and was largely attended, proving one of the most successful exhibitions for youths ever put on by the Y.M.C.A. The programme was directed by Ralph J. Albrant, general secretary of the Fredericton Y.M.C.A. here. The gymnasium committee consisted of Karl Walker, Ross Kerr, Stewart MacMillan, and Ronald Menzies.

The programme was carried out with skill and ability on the part of the young men and women and featured such novel gymnastic displays as a Japanese Lantern March, Ladder Pyramids by a high school class, "Black Nag" a folk dance by the junior girls, blindfold boxing, rope drill, parallel bars, musical interludes and a closing tableau topped off an outstanding performance, one which does credit not only to the young people themselves but to Mr. Albrant and the Y.M.C.A. committee.

The exhibition included a considerable variety of activities, the results achieved in the different activities being the result of expert supervision over a period of months by Secretary Ralph Albrant.

An amplifying system was used last evening, the exhibition being presented in the form of a broadcast over station Y.M.C.A. Bert Belding was an announcer.

After a short musical prelude the programme began with the introduction by the announcer who then featured Harry Ballantyne of Toronto, a member of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. Mr. Ballantyne briefly outlined the history of the Y.M.C.A. The organization was founded ninety-two years ago in London, England. The movement spread to North America, to the Orient and around the world to Central Europe. There are today six thousand active units scattered throughout about fifty countries with an enrollment of three million members.

"The demonstration represents only one phase of Y.M.C.A. work," Mr. Ballantyne said. This phase of the Y's activities is important not only because of the actual enjoyment in the exercises but because it builds health, muscular co-ordination and develops poise. To teach boys how to play straight helps them to think straight, Mr. Ballantyne concluded.

A spectacular feature was a shoulder stand by Ben McCarthy on top of the fifteen feet ladders.

Besides the routine, a number of specialties were done by Stuart MacMillan, Allen Glennie, Bert Willis, Jack Fraser, Gerald Hudson, Dallas Laskey.

The last number was a tableau representing many popular sports. Upon a decorated stand sat a little girl representing the principle of athletic achievement for its own sake rather than for winning of trophies. Miss Eleanor Monteith of Devon characterized this ideal. Figures representing the popular games and sports were grouped around the stand.
