directory," said G. W. Stegman. Mr. Stegman last night proposed to the Council that he be given full co-operation in undertaking the compilation of a directory of Fredericton. The cost to the city, he said, would be around \$300, this being the cost of a dozen pages in the directory which he would ask the municipality to buy for the purpose of including a short history of Fredericton in the book.

Mr. Stegman said he intended to engage unemployed persons in the house-to-house canvass, and expected to have that portion of the work finished by Christmas. If, however, as one alderman had previously suggested to him, he should take a census of the city at the same time, he would have to employ one more man, the burden of which expense, he felt, should rightfully be borne by the city.

In discussing the proposition, the members of the Council seemed to be fairly unanimous as regards the directory part of the petition, but opinion was pretty well divided in regard to the taking of the municipal census at this time. Ald. McKnight felt that the need for a census is not warranted by its cost. On the other hand, Ald. Forbes was desirous of having a careful census taken to settle the old dispute concerning the exact population of Fredericton. He expressed the opinion that a real census has never been taken in this city. It was decided to ask Mr. Stegman to be present at tonight's meeting to further discuss the question.

According to Ald. Mundle's report on the Municipal Home committee, in September 1936 the number of heads of families receiving city relief was 19, as compared with 18 for August; the number of dependants was 60, as compared with 55 for August; the amount expended for food \$258.44 as compared with \$288.05 in August; the amount for clothing, nil, as compared with \$14.19 for August; the amount for shelter \$69, as compared with \$73 for August; and the total expense \$327.44 as compared with \$375.25 for August.

In the discussion on the report it was revealed that while Saint John had 7,000 on relief and Moncton had 1,400, Fredericton had only 55. Ald. Forbes said that Fredericton should be commended. As one member expressed it, "Fredericton is holding up her end among the municipalities in the same manner that New Brunswick is holding up her's among the provinces. The situation is much like a partnership—one is spending and the other is saving."

It was decided by the Council to pay the bill for 63 dinners which was charged to the members of the fire department—amounting to \$31.50, and which was incurred when the local department feasted the visiting firefighters here Sunday.

A request for the immediate ditching and drainage of Beaverbrook street between Tweedsmuir and Regent from the residents of that street was read. It was referred to the Roads and Streets committee.

A request was read from the Common Council of the City of Saint John requesting that the local Council adopt a motion for the purpose of petitioning the Provincial Government to enforce the Provincial Housing Act. Ald. Mundle: "While good for Saint John it has just brought trouble to other cities." It was allowed to stand.

A motion was carried to the effect that a sign be placed at the parking place behind the Customs House in order to direct car operators to it.
