Interment will take place at Upper Gagetown.

HUNTING CAMP BURNED

A camp belonging to Lambert Ed gett of this city was burned to the ground over the week-end, with an es timated damage between four and five hundred dollars. The camp, located on the York-Sunbury County line near the Wilsey Road is believed to have burned early Sunday. The R.C.M.P. are now conducting investigations as to the source of the conflagrations, and Game Warden Louis Farrell is in vestigating on behalf of the New Brunswick Forest Service. Mr. Ed gett stated that he knew nothing of the fire until he came upon the smouldering ruins of the camp yester day noon. The camp was locked and he had not been near it since early Saturday. Everything in the building was destroyed, including two rifles, and numerous blankets and provi sions.

SIX PERCHERONS TO BE IMPORTED BY DOM. EXP. STA.

Supt. Bailey Predicts N. B. to Be Centre in Percheron Breeding

Horses Blooded Stock

Coming From Que. -- 4 Mares in Foal to High Class Stallion

Four pure-bred Percheron mares and two geldings have been secured by the local Dominion Experimental Station from the station at Ste. Anne de la Pocatiere, Que., is was announc ed last night by C. F. Bailey, superin tendent of the Fredericton farm.

This has been done with the object in view of establishing in New Brun swick a centre for the breeding of Percheron horses for the farmers of this province, and is directly in line with the provincial Department of Agri culture's policy of importing superi or horses for breeding purposes. Mr. Bailey stated. Last year the depart ment imported a car load of Percheron horses from Ohio.

The four mares are all in foal to a high-class stallion, Black Diamond, owned by the Dominion Government. The Fredericton station has had in its stables for some time a stallion named Laeteen, a half-brother of Black Diamond, and which was third in a class of 17 at the 1935 Chicago live stock exposition. "We are now in a position," said Mr. Bailey, "to estab lish a stud centre for New Brunswick or Maritime farmers wishing to breed Percheron horses."

"New Brunswick, I think, is destined to become a Percheron breeding cen tre," Mr. Bailey predicted. He pointed out that several years ago the Freder iction station had tried to introduce pure-bred Clydesdale stock, to encour age breeding, but that the farmers in New Brunswick had not responded very readily to that particular type. Most of them had wanted Percherons, he said.

The Clydesdales, which had been at the Fredericton station, had been shipped to the station at Nappan, N. S., where farmers seemed to prefer that breed, the superintendent said. Maritime farmers who wished to breed either type could now have access to both stud centres, he pointed out.

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MUNDLE REPORT SUBMITTED OF MUNICIPAL HOME COMMITTEE

Capital Transit "Unfair Competitors" -- Hanson Stegmann Proposes City Census.

A petition from the taxi drivers of this city against the Capital Transit Company, Limited, resulting from so called "un-fair competition" was pre sented to the members of the Freder iction City Council meeting in com mittee last night by Warren Han son. A request was also made by G. W. Stegman of Saint John for muni cipal co-operation in the task of com piling a city directory. There was also considerable discussion concern ing the financing and administration of relief and the difficulties the Council was experiencing with the system of municipal administration of justice.

Warren Hanson stated that the taxi drivers were experiencing unfair com petition on the part of the Capital Transit Company, Ltd., explaining that the latter was running special buses to compete with the taxis along various streets where its buses ordinarily did not run in order to get a little additional revenue, which, the speaker felt, rightly be longed to the taxi drivers. The com pany, he said, has been in the habit of sending special buses to meet trains, to the Fredericton Exhibition, and to pick up special parties when ever it pleased. William Vaughan, to whom the plaintiffs had complained, had declared that he would run his buses wherever he wished, since the plan of the company's route submit ted by him to the Council last Janu ary had never been approved.

Upon a motion of Ald. Crewdson it was decided to give the bus company ten days to present to the Council a plan specifying the route to be fol lowed by the buses, the schedule, the stopping places and the parking places.

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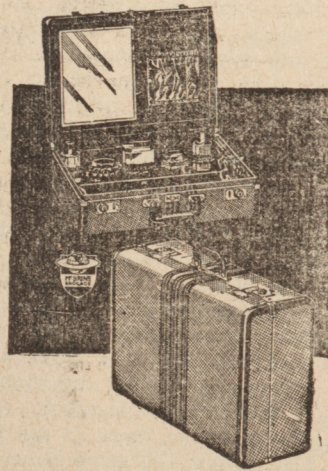
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
