## Lower Livestock Rate on C. N. R. in the Maritimes

Cooperative marketing in the Maritimes received a boost yesterday when the Transportation Commission of the Maritime Board of Trade concluded negotiations with the traffic management of the Canadian National Railways whereby a lower carload minimum and other privileges have been effected on the movement of livestock in the Maritime Provinces. The agricultural departments of the three Maritime Provinces co-operated in the negotiations.

This announcement is contained in a joint statement issued last night by J. D. McKenna of Saint John, chairman of the Transportation Commission, and Rand H. Matheson, transportation manager of the commission.

The new basis provides for a carload minimum of 10,000 lbs. on cattle, calves, hogs, sheep or lambs in straight or mixed carloads on movements not exceeding 200 miles; over that distance the normal basis applies.

### Other Changes

Some of the other changes under the new basis have been the elimination of the cleaning charge of 75 cents per car and a reduction in the stop-off charges to \$1 for the first stop-off, \$2 for the second and \$3 for each succeeding stop-off. Under the normal basis a \$3 charge is applicable for each stop-off in addition to a cleaning charge of 75 cents per car.

A comparison of the charges under the normal basis as compared with the new basis is as follows:

Lowest per car charge on sheep moving 150 miles — Normal basis, \$23.15; new basis, \$19.00.

Lowest per car charge on cattle moving 150 miles — Normal basis, \$32.75; new basis, \$19.00.

Lowest per car charge on hogs moving 150 miles—normal basis \$26.35; new basis, \$19.00.

(\* Calculated on a 16,000 lb. minimum.

### Mixed Carloads

Another feature of the basis is that on stock in mixed carloads under the normal basis the shipper is assessed at the highest rate and carload minimum applicable on straight carloads of the class of stock the car contains; under the new scheme the same charges prevail whether the stock shipped is of the same class or not. Shippers may be permitted to install, at their own expense, any extra decks or partitions desired without thereby increasing freight charges. That is, actual weight of the livestock will be charged for subject to minimum weight of 10,000 lbs.. In the event that one or more partitions are furnished by the railway company, a charge of 50 cents will be charged for each partition.

A shipper can still use the normal basis in cases in which the number of head of livestock at the normal rate makes a lower per car charge. That is, it would be cheaper for a shipper to move 1,000 lbs. of cattle a distance of 150 miles on the normal basis than it would on the new basis.

The lower carload basis will represent a reduction to the shipper who has not the quantity on hand to take full advantage of the carload minimum under the normal basis and consequently has to bear a higher per head

## Birthday Greetings From London Over C. N. Telegraphs

(Special to The Daily Mail)

VANCOUVER, July 7.—Six thousand miles of land wire and cable linked Vancouver with London, England, at 100 p.m. yesterday, when leaders in civic life exchanged greetings with dignitaries in the heart of the British Empire.

Through the Canadian National Telegraphs and its cable affiliations direct contact was maintained between the two cities for more than half an hour while Mayor G. G. McGeer, J. Y. McCarter, president Board of Trade, Roy Wilson, Rotary Club president, Walter Leek, chairman of the Exhibition Board; representatives of the Vancouver press; the lumber industry; and B. T. Chappell, General Superintendent, Canadian National Railways, extended felicitations.

Dignitaries who saluted Vancouver's golden jubilee in reply were the Lord Mayor of London; Viscount Elihu, chairman of Federation of Chambers of Commerce of the British Empire; Sir Hewitt Skinner, president Canadian Chamber of Commerce for Great Britain, P. Russell, managing editor, London Morning Post; W. A. McAdam, Acting Agent-General for British Columbia; Dr. R. Johnson, vice-president, Rotary Club of London; and P. A. Clews, European manager of the Canadian National Railways.

An interesting message was received from Mayor J. W. Raby of King's Lynn, England, birthplace of Captain George Vancouver, who announced his corporation was sending an oil painting to Vancouver with the Lord Mayor of London who is to visit here next month. The painting is of the custom's house where Vancouver's father was employed as deputy collector.

Viscount Elihu and Sir Hewitt Skinner both cabled they would visit Canada and Vancouver this summer and the Lord Mayor announced he was looking forward with pleasure to visiting Vancouver shortly. Mr. McAdam revealed that plans were going forward to hold a British Empire fair in the next few years. As an interesting feature for Vancouver's golden jubilee the occasion was a huge success in London with the press and the news reels well represented as the greetings were exchanged saluting this city's big birthday.

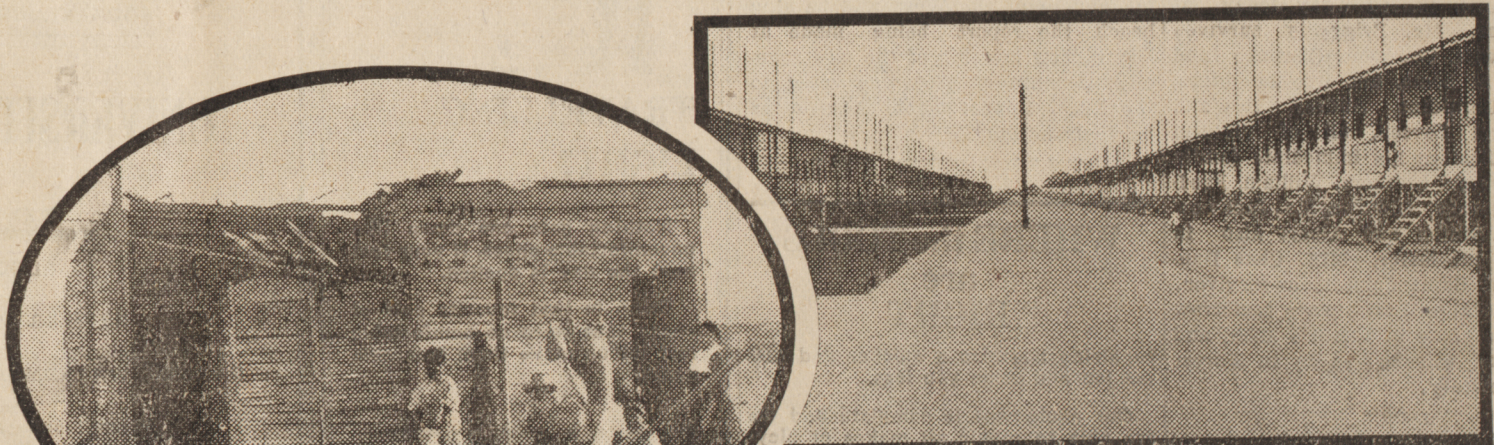

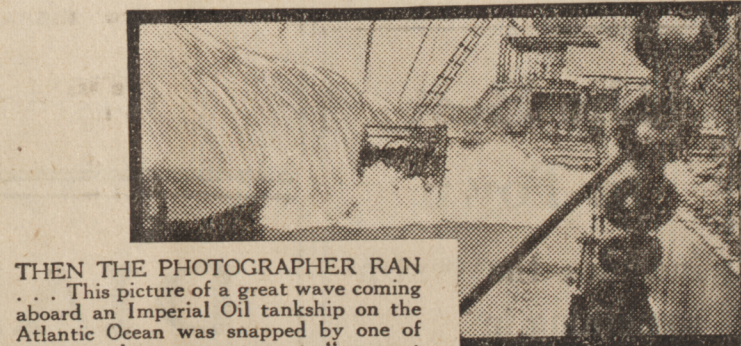

Foremost in the development, which involved expenditures of great sums of money put up by thousands of investors, was a program to house the native workers. Its result was that rows of neat dwellings like those above sprang up on the desert near the oil fields.
