New Device Creates Enormous Voltages

An improved system of generating extremely high voltage in which the equipment is virtually "wearless," has been developed by Dr. Odd Dahl, physicist of the Department of Terrestrial Magnetism at the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

Like the great electrostatic generator of Dr. Robert Van de Graaff of Massachusetts Institute of Technoloy which works on principles of electrostatic electricity known for half a century, the new device of Dr. Dahl goes back 50 years to the old rotating disk type electrostatic generator used by the German scientist Holz in the
