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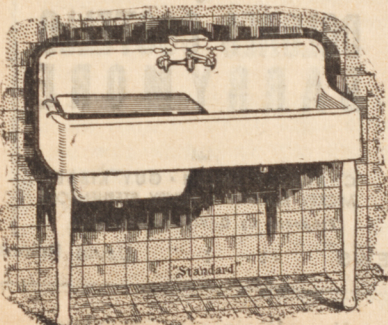

SOME CHILDREN DIFFICULT TO FATHOM

Some children are like babbling brooks; talking incessantly, and having a never-ending flow of senseless or sensible ideas.

There are others who are slow to answer a question, simply staring at you, or even hiding their faces. They seem to live an inner life that never finds expression. They are difficult to fathom. Their motives seem far away from the understanding of their elders. They shut themselves up within themselves. No one knows whether they care what others think. Children of this type are a problem in handling. Their silence may indicate depth of thought or feeling. On the other hand, it may not. They may be shallow or deep. They may even be under-handed and untrue. If intelligent and healthy it is well to leave them alone.

In most instances, however, it is well to find out what causes their reticence and to unlock their lips.

If your child is shy it may be because he is the victim of tactless speech corrections. If an elder is constantly on the lookout for faulty expressions, the child may be criticized all the time, especially when he is timid.

In the development of the child's language great care must be exercised not to discourage him.

There are children who have not the gift of conversation. Their thoughts are not quickly formulated in words. They can often express themselves better by drawing. They must be encouraged and a friendly talk about their work will draw them out.

The shy child who is talented needs loving understanding and help on the part of his parents. You must assist him to his environment, in having the budding time of his soul one of peace and undisturbed growth. Use love on this type of child.

The shy child, who is dull and uninteresting, and perhaps nervous and in ill health, needs careful training in expression, books to read, wholesome play and careful watching for expression signs. Use intelligence on this type.

Molded or Frozen Salads Help to Perk Up Jaded, Hot Weather Appetites

Despite the fact that the mercury may soar to all heights the family must eat. The housewife's problem is to serve something refreshing which will cause these jaded, heat-worn appetites to pick up and make their owners really enjoy food.

Why not tempt these listless folk with salads served on crisp lettuce? There are so many types made from interesting combinations that one should never be lacking in new ideas. There are salads for every course, occasion, taste and fancy.

It seems sometimes, as though the old favorite potato salad is a bit overworked, so let's try some new salad ideas.

Molded Grapefruit Salad

1½ tablespoons gelatin
½ cup boiling water
½ cup sugar
1 apple (cut in cubes)
½ cup nuts, broken in pieces
¼ cup cold water
2 cups grapefruit, pulp and juice.

Soak gelatine in cold water for five minutes. Add boiling water and sugar. Stir until dissolved. Add apple, grapefruit and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Put into individual molds which have

been dipped in cold water. Chill thoroughly. Remove from molds and arrange on crisp lettuce leaves. Garnish with dressing.

Frozen Fruit Salad

1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup whipped cream
1 cup cherries
1 cup crushed pineapple (drained)
Combine mayonnaise and whipped cream. Fold in cherries and pineapple. This salad may either be frozen in the tray of the refrigerator or in individual molds which are placed in the freezing unit.

Pear-Macaroni Salad

Halves of canned pears
1 package of cream cheese
Macaroni crumbs
Maraschino cherries
Mash cheese and spread a thin layer on a half of pear. Cover with another half pear and dip the whole pear, thus formed, in the macaroni crumbs. To prepare these crumbs—roll dry macaroons finely with a rolling pin. Serve the fruit in a cup of crisp lettuce, garnished on top with a maraschino cherry cut in half. Place a spoonful of mayonnaise at one side.

DON'T TAKE A BAD SUNBURN LIGHTLY, IT'S WISE TO SEE YOUR PHYSICIAN

After Results May Be Serious If Proper Treatment Is Not Given

A severe sunburn is not a minor, or skin-deep affair. One of the frequent sequences is nephritis (Bright's disease). If an attack of sunburn laid you low for even one day, the chances that your kidneys suffered, as much as you suffered, with aching, burning and complete exhaustion, are about even.

The sad part of this is that the nephritis may go on undetected until a subsequent illness even years later reveals a chronic nephritis. The origin of this will be a mystery to you if you never knew that sunburn could start up a nephritis, which is an inflammation of the kidneys.

Go To The Doctor

A good rule to follow after a sickening sunburn is to consult a physician. Have a specimen of urine examined. If the result of the analysis is negative, well and good, the nephritis was transient and no damage was done. But if it is still present (the urine will show albumen, pus cells and possibly casts) you will need treatment.

Burned skin, even mildly, over half or three quarters of the body obtained in one exposure invariably causes a toxemia, which makes one tired, thirsty, languid and stuporous, if not acutely ill.

The skin is one of the trio of eliminators which nature relies upon. If the skin is burned the pores are closed, they cease to function and excess work is put upon the kidneys. To help them rest is imperative, and liquids should be increased.

Complete Relaxation

That "dragged-through-a-knot-hole feeling" should be recognized. It is nature's warning that she is being taxed and needs assistance. If time can be spared one hour twice a day should be allotted to complete relaxation; lying flat in a darkened room is best.

For sufferers from intense heat but not sunburned, a tepid bath allowed to get almost cold taken slowly twice a day will help considerably. Expend the minimum of energy in taking a bath and the maximum of time to get the best result.

The amount of solid food should be cut in half for all heat sufferers and the amount of liquids should be increased by half. As much as two or three quarts a day can be assimilated if properly spaced. Two or three pieces of candy eaten during the forenoon and afternoon will quickly supply enough energy for the average person and will compensate for the absence of meat, eggs and starchy foods.

A Toxic Condition

This hot weather advice applies to those who suffer from excessive perspiration as well. The excretion of liquid (sweat) in an immoderate amount dries up the tissues and a toxic condition comparable to the

after effects of one who indulges not wisely but too well.

In brief, to lesson sunburn sequences one needs more rest, two baths a day taken slowly, less solids by one-half, more liquids by one-half and four to six pieces of candy a day. This applies to children as well as adults.

Summer Company Needs Planning By The Hostess

With summer company imminent all over the landscape, a lady with a house takes chin in hand to think of ways and means to entertain visitors without learning to hate them one and all. It's all in organization, we offer brightly, though we aren't always a shining example of that virtue. Goodness knows a lady can't be expected to be gracious and poised in a trailing chiffon with a baby crying, the roast burning and the company arriving all at the same time. To avoid such an impasse, it's important to plan ahead—first, that neither the company dinner nor the baby's bedtime should coincide automatically with the hour of the guest's arrival.

If the guest announces dogmatically that she is coming on the one and only train that arrives at the very time the baby is supposed to be bathed or fed or put to sleep, then get a neighbor's high school daughter to look after the baby for a while. Failing that, let the guest wait. That's all right if you don't get flustered yourself and repeat your apologies too often. . . . In short, be casual, remember that a tranquil baby is more important to the guest's good times—to say nothing of the baby's welfare—than utmost promptness in being properly welcomed.

And about the roast, don't time the big dinner anywhere near the hour the guest is expected to turn up. . . . If you think food is necessary, have iced tea or fruit juice and some canapés and cakes. That will be easy on you and more refreshing than something heavy.

Then have the guest room in perfect order, so that you won't have to be trotting around getting necessities you've forgotten. It doesn't cost much to make a guest room fresh looking and pretty if you can do the sewing yourself. Navy blue shepherd's check gingham or taffeta is cute for the bedspread and curtains, if you make a pleated flounce for the spread and a pleated valance for the curtains.

Use white voile curtains, white voile dressing table skirt with pleated check collar around the top. White wall, bright red woodwork, red chintz chair covers and pads for the seats. Hooked rugs with red in the pattern.

BETTER METHODS OF TEACHING LATIN ARE CONSIDERED

Annual Meeting of Classical Association Opens At Sackville

SACKVILLE, Aug. 3—The sixth annual meeting of the Classical Association of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland convened recently at Mount Allison University. Dr. J. W. Cohoon, Sackville, president, was in the chair, and there was a large attendance.

After a brief address of welcome by the president, a paper on "The Teaching of Elementary Latin" was read by Prof. W. H. Thompson, of Acadia University. Speaking from his many years' experience in teaching, Dr. Thompson made a plea for a more sympathetic consideration of Latin itself. All the objectives to be gained by the study of Latin were best gained by learning the Latin. It should be taught as a real language, and the student should be taught to pronounce the language at the start, he said. Then his progress would be easier, if not too much attention was paid to the abstract nomenclature.

Miss Muriel Dixon, Mount Allison University, gave a paper on "Some Methods of Teaching Latin." Her remarks were drawn from her own practical experience and she gave four cardinal principles in elementary work: First, make Latin interesting; second, make first-year Latin valuable for general culture; third, minimize the difficulties of beginning Latin; fourth, prepare thoroughly for second-year work. A brief discussion followed.

At the evening session, Dr. Cedric Yeo, of King's Collegiate School, Windsor, N. S., gave an interesting address on "Roman Life in Pompeii," illustrated by lantern slides.

The delegates were entertained at dinner in the diningroom of Mount Allison University residence. On Saturday morning an address on Latin textbooks will be given by Miss Lois Creighton, Halifax, and the observance of the bi-millennium of Augustus will be discussed. Reports will be presented and officers elected for the ensuing year.

HOT WEATHER BROUGHT VISITORS TO MARITIMES

MONCTON, August 3—The cool ocean breezes of the Maritime provinces after the recent excessive heat in Upper Canada lured the greatest number of visitors from Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa and other centres in Ontario to one time on the bargain fare coach excursion operated by the Canadian National Railways which arrived in Moncton today. It was necessary to operate the Ocean Limited from Montreal in two sections to take care of the passengers, about three hundred in number. The excursionists were for different sections of the Maritimes, some for Nova Scotia and others for points in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, who continued on through by train to their destinations. One of the passengers was on a visit to her sister living in Halifax. Last year she took advantage of a similar excursion and stated that, if it were not for the coach excursions, probably many would not have the opportunity of visiting their relatives and friends. She greatly enjoyed her trip east on this latest excursion.
