

## PREVENT EXPORT OF FINE HORSES TO EUROPE

### Horsemen Owe Debt of Gratitude to Messrs. Sheppard and Myers.

Horsemen interested in maintaining American supremacy in the production of fast trotters owe a debt of gratitude to Messrs. Sheppard and Myers, of the Hanover Shoe Farms, for preventing the export to Europe of the foremost living sons of Peter the Great, 2:07 1/4, and Guy Axworthy. When the late William M. Wright's Culmet Farm stud was dispersed after his death in 1933, W. J. Rosemire, a well known buyer for the foreign market, was one of the contending bidders for Peter the Great, 2:02 1/2, and again at the recent closing out sale of Henry Knight's horses he carried the bidding up to \$14,500 for Mr. McElwyn. On each occasion it was Lawrence B. Sheppard who outstaid Rosemire and obtained the outstanding sire for the Pennsylvania nursery by paying \$15,000 for Peter the Great and \$15,500 for Mr. McElwyn.

Peter the Great, now eighteen years old, topped the list of winning sires in 1935 with fifty-five of his offspring earning brackets in the course of the campaign, according to compilations of W. H. Gocher, secretary of the National Trotting Association. Peter Volo, 2:02, whose fifty-two winners last year gave him second place on the list, nosed out the younger son of Peter the Great in 1936 with fifty-nine winners to fifty-seven for Peter the Great. Mr. McElwyn this year holds fourth place among the winning sires, but since Peter Volo is no longer living, and Truax, 2:03 1/2, the son of Guy Axworthy that ranks third, is now in Italy, the two Hanover stallions rank first and second among living sires in this country.

Twenty miles north of San Diego the traveller on the Santa Fe Railroad sees the new trotting track at Del Mar, Calif., where there is talk of holding a Grand Circuit meeting in 1937. The half-mile course and its appointments, including grandstand and stables, were constructed by the Federal Works Progress Administration. They constitute the San Diego County Fair Ground, which is within a stone's throw of the Pacific surf. The rather narrow two-lap ring has been built up three or four feet above the level of its low surroundings. Although two or three meetings were held here this year the grandstand is without a roof, and the place now looks less suitable for Grand Circuit racing than almost any of the half-mile tracks in operation in the vicinity of New York.

the case right along. Notice of motion to have the by-law changed had been given at the October meeting of the council.

#### Oath of Allegiance

Marysville's town council renewed their oath of allegiance to the crown last night by taking the oath of fealty to His Majesty King George VI. The council was sworn in again by the town clerk, N. C. Cochrane.

A grant of \$50 was granted for the building of an open air rink for the use of the children during the winter. The town solicitor advised that it would be necessary for the town to get legislation to place snow fences on private lands, without the permission of the property owners. The council wish to keep the roads open for the winter and snow fences are deemed a necessity in this winter project.

The finance committee report showed that the bank balance was \$2,722.95, but after this month's bills are passed it will cause an overdraft, and the town clerk was authorized to arrange with the bank for an overdraft.

The matter of several poor families who haven't yet established Marysville as the place of residence was taken up and was referred to the poor and relief committee with instruction to take whatever action necessary.

#### Mayorality Matter

The matter of the civic election in Marysville still hangs fire. Whether Mayor J. Walter Walker will run again is not yet certain and Ald. Horace Pettigrove stated today that "things were still up in the air." He himself, has not yet decided whether he will accept nomination for mayor this year. Should Ald. Pettigrove for the report is that Hilton Robinson will offer for alderman in Ward One, which Ald. Pettigrove would automatically vacate. The Marysville election date is the last Saturday in January.

#### ROUTINE BUSINESS

The Devon town council at its December meeting last night considered mostly routine business, hearing reports and passing accounts. His Worship Mayor A. J. McEvoy was in the chair. Decision was made to put a new street light on School street and a roof ladder will be purchased for the fire department. Aldermen present were Flower, Dobie, Ladds, Ashfield and Bailey.

During excavations undertaken near the Sphinx of Giza, a limestone stela of unusual size has been discovered. It bears an inscription recording its erection by Amenhotep II in the second year of his reign (1447 B. C.). According to F. A. Smyth, Cairo manager of the American Express Travel Service, the inscription is in the usual bombastic style of the Pharaohs. Amenhotep boasts of his athletic prowess, recording how he had rowed a boat for three miles against the stream with an oar twenty ells long without fatigue, when his rowers tired after half a mile; how he trained his horses so that they could be driven galloping without sweating, and how he had shot from his chariot at copper targets as thick as his hand and had driven the arrows clean through the targets.
